The Committee is empowered to visit institutions for like purposes in other places and acquire information and submit their findings at the next term of said Court.

The gentlemen composing the Committee are intelligent and progressive, and that they will offer suggestions and plans for the betterment of the conditions of the poor unfortunate goes without saying.

The ramshackle that now serves the purpose is a disgrace to a civilized community.

That there have not been more accidents and deaths at the place is rather good luck than otherwise.

To begin with the inmates should be housed under one roof with all modern and up-to-date conveniences.

The place should be heated by steam or hot water, there should be a sufficient number of bath-tubs to keep the inmates clean and healthy, there should be separate apartments for the infirm, epileptics and idiots should not be permitted to

mingling with the old and feeble, who, through misfortune and vicissitude, are compelled to seek a home at this eleemosynary institution.

Let the Committee start on its tour of inspection as soon as convenient, visit the best infirmaries and try and get the best ideas possible.
