Mr. George Flora, aged 44, of Shannon, died yesterday morning.

The remains will be interred today in the Maysville Cemetery.

MRS. THOMAS BREEN
Mrs. Thomas Breen, another old and highly respected resident of this city, died this morning at her home on the Fleming pike.

About ten days ago Mrs. Breen sustained a fall at her home, suffering a fracture of the right hip joint, and her death was the result of that injury.

Deceased was born in County Waxford, Ireland, sixty-eight years ago, and the past fifty years of her life had been spent in this city. She is survived by her husband, and one sister, Mrs. P. H. Breen of East Second street. The funeral will take place at 9 o'clock Friday morning from St. Patrick's Church, the Rev. P. M. Jones conducting the services. The interment will be in the Cemetery at Washington.

MRS. MARY J. STYLES
The venerable Mrs. Mary J. Styles passed peacefully and gently away at her home in Houston avenue yesterday morning at 12:30 o'clock, after an illness of eight months of general debility and old age, her husband, Cornelius Styles, having preceded her to the grave some five years ago.

She was born in Germantown August 26th 1820, and had resided there all her long and useful life with the exception of four or five years spent in this city.

Mrs. Styles came of old pioneer stock, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John A. Reeves, having moved from Pennsylvania to that section when Germantown was a comparative wilderness. She was the last of a family of thirteen.

Early in life she became a member of the M. E. Church, South, and lived and died a thorough Christian.

She leaves three children, one daughter and two sons—Miss Elvira and Alfred and William Styles, all of this city—William being the representative of the Continental Tobacco Company at this place.

The funeral will be held in the M. E. Church, South, this morning at 11 o'clock at Germantown, Rev. Hall Pollitt conducting the service.

Interment will be in the Knights of Pythias Cemetery, by the side of her husband.
