THE state of Mississippi has in its Treasury \$1.56, and there is no relief in sight. Much doubt is expressed in financial circles whether a firm of New York and Chicago brokers, who recently purchased a bond issue of \$500,000, will pay for it, and the Banks of the state seemingly are unwilling to advance money for immediate use. But, then, what could be expected of a state that would elect such a fellow as VARDAMAN as its Governor!

ACCORDING to a rough census made by Professor HAMAN of Switzerland, there are 19,000,000 Jews in the world. Of these it is figured that the United States has 1,000,000, Europe 10,000,000 and countries outside of Europe 8,000,000. Professor HAMAN gives this distribution of the Jews in Europe: Russia, 5,000,000; Austria-Hungary, 1,860,000; Germany, 568,000; Rumania, 300,000; Great Britain, 200,000; Turkey, 120,000; Holland, 97,000; France, 77,000.

ANOTHER great strike has come to an end—and with it the defeat of the strikers. Its cause and results may be stated thus—Duration of strike to date, 57 days; number of cities affected, 12; number of men involved, 61,624; number of men involved in Chicago, 26,624; loss in wages to men in twelve cities, \$4,150,000; loss in wages to men in Chicago, \$2,205,000; loss to packers in all cities, (estimated,) \$8,000,000; deaths due to strike disorders in Chicago, 6; persons injured during strike in Chicago, 213; cause of the strike, refusal of packers to continue last year's wage scale of 18 1/4 cents an hour for unskilled laborers.

ANOTHER DISMAL FAILURE.

After Losing \$5,000,000 in Wages, the Meat Strikers Return to Work

At Chicago the Executive Board of Butcher Workmen has abandoned the strike of the Union on the meat packing plants and ordered the members back to work.

The packers have won the victory and they dictated the terms upon which a settlement was reached.

The men will get even smaller wages than they were receiving when the strike began, and non-Union men will be retained by the packers as far as possible.

When the packers were advised that it had been decided to end the strike they announced that they would give places as far as possible to the skilled men, but it was said at the same time that many of these men would be unable

to secure their old places.

During the strike approximately 53,000 persons have been involved in the struggle, which is estimated to have cost the men about \$5,000,000 in wages, as against an estimated loss of \$7,500,000 to the packers in loss of business and in increased expenses.

The greatest number of men idle in Chicago during the strike was 26,600 and the total in the country outside of this city is estimated to be about the same.

The original cause of the strike was a demand by the Butchers' Union that the packers pay to the unskilled workmen 18 1/4 cents an hour.

The packers refused an agreement, but offered to arbitrate the question.

Remarkable Contrast.

Goebellism first fixed itself on the Democratic party of Kentucky six years ago. Many of the best citizens, who, until the passage of the Goebel Law in 1898, were Democrats, no longer belong to that party. But the party as an organization has accepted Goebellism with all the repression, exclusion, injustice and tyranny it implies. Goebellism means nothing else but the taking away from the voters the right of selecting the man of their choice for political honors and responsibilities, vesting that right in one or more professional politicians. Defeated at the polls in 1899, Goebellism triumphed through Legislative juggling and theft in 1900. It counted the Hon. John W. Yerkes out of the Governorship in the fall of that same year. It has since carried a state Democratic primary for Governor Beckham, and given him constitutionally a second Gubernatorial term. It made itself brutally manifest last fall in the two principal cities of the state, Louisville and Lexington, where the stealing of polls and the stuffing of ballot-boxes was carried out with a

revolutionary disregard for every form of law and decency.

Goebellism again showed its strength, as far as the Democracy is concerned, in the recent Fifth Appellate Court District Convention. A Chairman was appointed by factional trickery. He had been, according to the statement of certain candidates, induced by promises by the man for whom he was to Goebelize the nomination. He did his work with the thoroughness of a Redwine. He arbitrarily unseated one set and as arbitrarily seated another set of delegates. The Convention Hall was packed with Lexington police in the interest of Judge Cantrill, the Goebellistic candidate. Amid scenes of violence, infamy and despotism, unknown in Kentucky till 1899, Cantrill was nominated. An appeal was made to the Democratic State Central Committee. That body was, however, so profoundly Goebellized itself that it readily declared the Cantrill rapine valid.

The Republican party held a primary for a Congressional candidate in the Eleventh District on the 9th of August last. Frauds of a glaring and utterly indefensible character were charged to have been committed. The Republican State Central Committee promptly and decisively intervened. That body, resolved that Goebellism should never entrench itself within the Republican line of battle, has ordered a fair count by the District Committee. No ballot stuffing can secure Republican nominations in Kentucky. The party that wants fair state elections must have fair primaries within its own ranks. The ghost of Goebellism that a few brief weeks ago mysteriously stole into a Republican stronghold has been chased back to perpetual infamy.
