Latest News

Count Nottack, a Chamberlain of the Czar, died suddenly.

Andrew J. Mead, the founder of Manhattan, Kas., died at Yonkers, N. Y.

Henry Walton, a life Senator of France and known as the "Father of the French Constitution," is dead.

The Emperor of Russia has decided to send to Manchuria the second division of Infantry of the Loyal Guards.

George T. Smith, a Chicago capitalist, died at his home after a race with death all the way from Carlsbad, Bohemia.

Three prisoners confined on an island in East river, New York, are believed to have perished during the storm Sunday.

A big hotel solely for working girls and working women will be built on the West Side in New York by wealthy philanthropists.

The President will shortly begin an order extending the civil service regulations to the employes of the Isthmian Canal Commission.

Nine native scouts and one American attached to the Hospital Corps were killed in an ambush on the East coast of Samar, in the Philippines.

An attempt to open the cotton mills in the Fall River, Mass., district, closed for nearly four months on account of a strike, resulted in failure.

A. F. Jaurer, Editor of The Venezuelan Herald and believed to be an American citizen, has been expelled from Venezuela by President Castro.

Social Democrats in New York, encouraged by the vote cast in the recent election, have decided to at once begin an active campaign with 1908 in view.

In arguing the Berea College indictment at Nicholasville on demurrer, the Hon. John G. Carlisle attacked the constitutionality of the Day Law on the ground that it was in conflict with the Fourteenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States. The case will come up at the February term of Court.

A dispatch from the Japanese headquarters before Port Arthur says the Japanese troops gained the moats of the principal forts assailed on October 30th and captured the galleries running North of the Keekwan forts. They are now sapping to dislodge the Russians from parts of the moats which are still being held. The Japanese casualties in the general attack of October 30th are said to have been 1,000.

River News. The Katie Mack is on her way to the Kanawha river with empties. The H. F. Frisbie, old-time towboat built at Cincinnati, will be dismantled. Repairs to the packet Big Kanawha are completed at the Marine Ways in Fulton. The Little Bay is lying up at Cincinnati for slight repairs. The Greenland is running in her place in the Cincinnati-Louisville trade. Owing to the low stage of water but seven out of eighty-nine of the registered river craft that ply out of Pittsburgh are able to run. The towboat Alice Brown, laid up for repairs since July, has been equipped with the electric light plant of the Fred Wilson and will go in the Louisville-New Orleans trade. Only a slight rise occurred at the headwaters of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers as a result of Sunday's rain and snow, and as yet there is no hope for relief from the present low stage of water. Coal is still piling up in the Pittsburgh harbor.
