## LOOK FOR IT HERE

Men and women of today are, on an average, nearly two inches taller than their ancestors, which increase is doubtless due to the growth of athletics.

Ellen Kay, one of the foreign leaders of the movement for equal rights for women, expressed her regrets in a recent lecture in Vienna at the "Americanization" of that movement.

The Czar holds some \$6,000,000 worth of stock in the Pennsylvania Railroad, the New Jersey Central, the New York Central and the Canadian Northern Pacific, which yields him handsome returns.

A large lump of butter has been found buried in an Irish bog. No one knows how old it is. It is thought that it is at least one hundred years old, possibly ten centuries. The butter is said to be in excellent condition.

One of the most remarkable opals in existence is supposed to be a fossil fragment of the cinoliasan, which once lived in Australia, reaching a length of forty feet. The specimen, lately brought to New York, weighs 1,150 karats.

Golf is greatly indulged in by the naval officers and European residents in China. In consequence, the Chinese boys have grasped some idea of the game, and they are frequently to be seen amusing themselves with an old stick converted into a club and a real golf ball which some golfer has lost.

The United Kingdom is the largest single market of American clover seed, absorbing about one-third of the total exports. Of this quantity the largest portion is taken in England, but there is a good market for the seed in Belfast, from which point the farmers of Northern Ireland are supplied.

The Duke of Sutherland is one of the greatest land owners in the world. He owns about 1,250,000 acres in Scotland, and many thousand acres in England. His landed property is exceeded only by that of the Czar and of the Esterhazy family. Despite his vast wealth, the Duke is unassuming and democratic.

Texas or Illinois has more miles of railway than Italy, which ranks next to Germany, Russia, France, Austria-Hungary and Great Britain among European countries. New York, which stands below the two states named, has more miles of railway than Spain, and more than Belgium, the Netherlands and Switzerland.

Of the 550,000 miles of main track railway in the world, very nearly two-fifths or 214,000 miles are in the United States at this moment. All of Europe has only 180,000 miles. The German Empire, which ranks next to the United States, has 33,000 miles. England the earliest, of all the countries in the railway field, from which we got our first locomotives, cars and rails, has 22,000 miles. England in this case meaning the United Kingdom.

The Nevada Legislature has just adjourned with a remarkable record. It repealed every restrictive gambling and liquor law on the books. The only restriction of the kind it retained was the one on prize fighting.

At a meeting of the Amalgamated Society of Tailors in London, a member stated that she knew of a woman who had made a cloth skirt—plaited, tabbed, trimmed with bands and buttons—for 9d, the said skirt being ticketed in the shop window "The best English tailormade."

According to dispatches from India there have been approximately 14,000 deaths as the result of the present earthquakes in the Kangara and Palampur districts, which would put the catastrophe high up among the lists of the greatest of modern times. Places of honor in this catalogue of destruction are held by the great earthquake at Lisbon, November 1st, 1775, which left the city a heap of ruins and destroyed 60,000 lives.

There are in Nova Scotia 25,000 men who devote nearly all their time the year around to the sea fisheries. The fishing fleet numbers 550 vessels and there are 1,400 boats. Seven million fishing traps for lobsters and other purposes are in use. The lobster canneries number 240, and there are 242 ice houses and freezers. Fifty small steamers are employed collecting and carrying fish to places of manufacture or shipment.
