## HOME FIRST, THE WORLD AFTER

The Magnolia Flour Mills Are Not Eclipsed Anywhere.

Now Remodeled Into a Modern Model Plant of Best Design.

One of the most notable industries, which is the good fortune of Maysville to possess, is that conducted by Mr. R. A. Carr, known as the Magnolia Flour Mills, and upon which, at the present time, important and very costly improvements are now nearing completion. Larger plants exist, but when these

are finished, none there are anywhere in this United States, which are more perfectly equipped throughout. The capacious three story mill structure is numbered 121, 123 and 125 East Fourth street, covering ample ground, and was erected about 1890 by Mr. Carr. It has ever been the policy of this enterprising gentleman to adopt every late improved device and appliance known to the milling craft, as fast as its superiority has been well proven. A decided illustration of the proof of these remarks is readily evidenced by the

THOROUGH REMODELING which for many weeks has been steadily under way and are now rapidly nearing completion. These costly improvements include an immense steel storage tank or elevator, absolutely fire-proof and fitted with the new approved pneumatic conveying system, one of the very few of its kind to be installed in Kentucky. This has been constructed by the Steel Storage and Elevator Construction Co. of Buffalo, New York; and has a capacity of storing 25,000 bushels of grain. This gigantic steel tank looms up imposingly to a height of 35 feet and is some 34 feet across in diameter. It is quartered into four separate compartments, and while distant from the mill proper a safe heat or fire space, is thus safeguarded, yet a series of pneumatic tubes automatically convey the grain direct from the weighing scales right into these compartments. A reversible motion re-

turns it in any needed quantities to the mill. Great economies are effected both in time, labor and handling the grain by this system. Work is being diligently pushed here to have it ready for the new harvest. Aside from this, there are many

OTHER NEW INSTALLATIONS, as the entire equipment of the mill has been completely overhauled, and several late new minor devices have superseded previous appliances. Too much space would be required to list and describe these improvements, which can most succinctly be stated, that the equipment and appointments throughout have been brought right-up-to-date, and are the best known to milling science. One other new appointment at least should be noted, and that is the installation of a powerful Corliss engine of the latest pattern. It can be summed up that Mr. Carr has spared no outlay to effect this

MODEL TRANSITION, and when it is taken into consideration the extreme care exercised in all the details of milling, the improved full roller process—the John T. Hayes system with the Stevens rolls—the securing of this choice home grown limestone soil winter wheat, the minute painstaking supervision constantly maintained over every stage of milling, for uniformity of excellence in production—it is then small wonder that the productions of the Magnolia Flour Mills occupy a high place. Thus it is that the brands of this mill justly enjoy celebrity with both trade and consumers, and now will attain even a higher notch of excellence than ever before. It is safe to say that they will not be surpassed by any flour produced in the United States, and rarely will be equalled. The several grades and

NOTED BRANDS which emanate here are "Magnolia Patent" and "Best Patent," equal fancy patents, "Big C. Straight," as indicated by its name a straight flour, "Sea Foam Fancy" and "Ideal Fancy," similar grade flours, and "Globe Family." These are all superior articles of the grades specified, are all made from the same high grade milling wheat, and the process by which this flour is made insures productions which for strength, color, purity and even uniformity at all times cannot be excelled. So also as regards bolted and unbolted meal, Graham flour

and other products turned out, the very high standard attainable accrues throughout.

For the benefit of farmers, a regular custom exchange trade is carried on, and this is a big item with this house. Farmers should remember also that Mr. Carr will always pay top market prices for wheat. Also will provide free storage for wheat until January let for those wishing to hold wheat. A capital trade is also carried on in bran, chop, mill feed, grain, baled hay, field seeds, coal and salt, ample outside storage facilities being at hand. The daily capacity of flour alone will now be 100 barrels each 24 hours, the mill running day and night.

Reverting now to some general milling features and

GENERAL INFORMATION, the writer, with an intimate acquaintance with the milling trade, clear to Duluth and the Dakotas, now wishes to record some facts, and measure due encomium to Mr. Carr and the Magnolia Flour Mills for the part so well sustained here.
