ADDRESS OF WELCOME

Henry Watterson Will Welcome the Home-Coming Kentuckians

Hon. Henry Watterson has been chosen to deliver the Address of Welcome to the Home-coming Kentuckians; and his acceptance is in the following classic form—

MR. WATTERSON'S ACCEPTANCE.

JANUARY 11th, 1906.—My Dear Sir: I gratefully accept the invitation with which you have honored me. Nothing could give me livelier pleasure, or fill me with a deeper sense of obligation to my fellow-citizens, than to be chosen as their mouthpiece in the delivery of the welcome to the Home-coming Kentuckians who are to join us next June in the celebration of our mother land.

It may not be known to many that, although I first saw the light outside the state, my forebears were all Virginians and Kentuckians, my paternal grandmother, born in the old fort at Harrodsburg, my paternal grandfather, the earliest Preacher of Madison county, and all my kindred Revolutionary soldiers and pioneers. I heard from the lips of a gray-haired grand-uncle the sublime epic of the pathfinder; as a child I carried the game-bag of one who had actually fought the Indians and hunted wild beasts, and all my life I have carried in my blood the spirit of forest rangers and the music of the greenwood tree. So it happens that I shall be able to speak not without some warrant, nor in words wholly borrowed from books.

Once a Kentuckian, always a Kentuckian be the keynote now and forever, as be the blessing of God upon our Festival.

I am, Dear Sir, to you, and to the neighbors and friends, your colleagues, who have given me so signal a proof of their confidence and favor, your and their very humble and ever-faithful servant, HENRY WATTERSON.

ONE GOOD LAW

That is Almost Wholly Disregarded By Professional Men

One of the very best laws on the statute books of this Commonwealth is that requiring physicians to return an annual report of all the births and deaths in which they were the attending physician to the County Clerk's office, where the same is made a matter of record.

The law is a wise and excellent one and should be enforced to the very letter, but, like many another good law, is allowed to become dead and obsolete from its non-compliance on the part of the doctors and its non-enforcement by the County Attorney.

Section 2582 of the Kentucky Statutes reads: It is the duty of practicing physicians to report time and place of birth, name of father and maiden name of mother and their residence, sex and color of child, together with its name, if it shall receive one, and whether it was born alive or dead, and showing, in case of death, the time, place and cause of death, the name, age, sex, color and condition—whether single, married or widowed—name and surname of parents, occupation, residence and place of birth. Penalty \$5 to \$20 in each case.

The reports are to be filed in the County Clerk's office not later than January 10th in each year.

There are probably as many as forty-five practicing physicians in this city and Mason county and of the whole number only two have fulfilled the requirements of the law by making an annual and full report.

Dr. W. P. Dobyne of Lewisburg reports 11 births and 2 deaths.

Dr. G. H. Bane of Orangeburg reports 10 births and 9 deaths.

Likewise Ministers and those authorized by law to solemnize marriages are required to make returns of same to the County Clerk's office—and be it said to their credit that they live up to the law and make due returns as is required of them.

Now all those who have neglected and failed to do as the law says they shall do, no doubt, would become quite indignant and feel themselves highly aggrieved should County Attorney Slattery execute the law by arraigning them in Court to show cause why they defied and disobeyed one of the most important laws in the statute book—especially if a \$5 to \$20 fine in each case was tacked on.

It's law; why not enforce it!
