TELEPHONE MEETING

The Mason County Mutual Now Entirely Free From Debt

An interesting meeting of the Board of Directors of the Mason County Mutual Telephone Company was held yesterday afternoon in the County Clerk's office.

Among other important matters was the announcement that the Company was now entirely out of debt and that the line belonged to the stockholders free of encumbrance.

Over \$10,000 has been expended in constructing the line and those who put their money and faith in the enterprise have the satisfaction of knowing that the outlook is brighter and better than since first launched.

The system is a great convenience to the rural dwellers, and that it is appreciated by the farming element is manifested in the hearty support given the Company.

Extended improvements are contemplated in order to give the best service possible for the least money.


