Our Washington Letter Gossip From the Nation's Busy Capital. Washington, D. C., Aug. 30th, 1906. Among the foreign powers which have accepted the invitation of the United States to participate in the Jamestown Exposition ceremonies next year are England, France, Germany, Russia and twenty-two others of the leading Governments of the world. The "Jamestown Expo" is stirring up the movement for good roads. It is stated that the city of Norfolk will expend \$200,000 in the construction of modern speedways between the two places. Besides, the Old Dominion is alive to the situation and is co-operating with the auto fends of the country to construct good roads from Washington through to Richmond and other historical places to the Exposition. The auto is a great vehicle, but the autoist is a menace to public safety and health. Every state in the Union should have a law holding that a person who kills another with an automobile is guilty of murder or manslaughter, with lesser grades of punishment for minor cases of personal injury. The average autoist has no regard whatever for the right of pedestrians and considers that the public highways were made especially for automobile speedways. But the time is almost ripe when the great common people will rise up and defend themselves from the terrors of the streets and highways which roll on noiseless wheels and batter the life out of them. It is now reported that Secretary of War Taft will soon make formal announcement of his declination of the proffered position on the Supreme Court Bench. It appears that Judge Taft is really in the field as a candidate for Presidential honors and is so considered by his friends. It is stated that Mr. Taft is not worried by the stories that emanate from Oyster Bay declaring that President Roosevelt recently predicted that Speaker Cannon would be the next President. He knows a better story than that. It is that the President never said anything of the kind; that if he said it he never meant it, and that the President is for W. H. Taft and not for Uncle Joe Cannon. The new railway rate bill went into operation last Tuesday, August 28th, and the railroads of the country are rapidly conforming to the requirements of the new law.
