River News

Gage marks 7.0 and rising.

The Greenland is tonight's up-river packet.

The J. T. Hatfield and Douglas Hall passed up light.

September has been the driest month of the year. Not a rise of any size has occurred in the rivers this month. August overdid itself in furnishing three coal shipping stages, covering about twice as many days.

River prophets are out at Pittsburgh with predictions that there will be a shipping stage in the rivers in two or three weeks. There is a large quantity of coal in the harbor to be sent out and coal operators are well prepared for a shipping stage.

River coal operators of the Pittsburgh district will attend the hearing in Cincinnati next Tuesday to enter a vigorous protest against one of the piers of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Bridge crossing the Ohio river at Parkersburg. During the past few years coal operators declare they have lost fortunes in accidents due to the position of one of the piers.

Only a short time ago the woman whose inventive brain gave the ice cream freezer to delighted humanity died at an advanced age in Philadelphia. This was Mrs. Nancy M. Johnson.

The heirs of one of the victims of the Grantham (Eng.) Railway disaster have received \$10,000 insurance, which was effected at a cost of one penny. The insured was a regular subscriber to a London penny weekly, which insures its readers against accidents and death. The day of the disaster he sent his bag, containing a current copy of the paper duly signed, to the hotel at Retford, where he expected to pass to New York. Within a few hours of his death the claim was examined, allowed, and settled.

Prices of choice cuts of meats are soaring in Chicago, and the latest boost by the big packers will become general throughout the country in a few days, according to the information being sent out all along the line. The advance to the local trade is from 2 to 3 cents in the last three weeks. A second raise of 1 to 2 cents will become effective this week, according to local dealers.
