**JAMESTOWN EXPOSITION Suffers Heavy Loss—Six Persons Perish in Fire and Fifty Buildings Destroyed**

At an early hour yesterday morning fire broke out in the hotel reservation adjoining the Jamestown Exposition grounds and property valued at over \$200,000 was destroyed and six lives were lost.

Between forty and fifty structures were consumed, and probably 1,000 people homeless. The blaze originated in the Berkley hotel on 102d street. The destroyed buildings were of temporary construction, the Arcade hotel with 280 rooms being the largest and costliest, representing an investment, including furniture and equipment, of \$80,000.

The cause of the fire is as yet unknown. The loss is placed at between \$200,000 and \$250,000 with about 20% insurance, the high rates having been almost prohibitive for taking of large risks on the frame structures.

The Inside Inn and the Kentucky State Building on the Western side of the Exposition grounds, as well as the Negro Building and auxiliaries thereto were threatened for a time, owing to the wind, but the fire reached nothing inside of the grounds. The Arcade, Royal Pine, Hampton Roads, Washington House, Outside Inn, Powhattan, Carolina and Berkley Hotels were among the largest buildings destroyed.

The stage of water is holding sufficiently to permit the Ohio packets to operate without difficulty. After this year, however, the towboats will be able to go all the way into the Pittsburgh harbor, as the dam will be completed.

Two hundred people had a narrow escape on board the Jewel, an excursion steamer, which was blown into the Kentucky shore three miles above Henderson, in a terrific windstorm Sunday evening. Ninety-five per cent. of the excursionists jumped from the second deck to the shore, a height of twenty feet. The boat was blown against the shore with such force that the deck was covered several inches deep with dirt.
