BIG SUM

For Ohio River Improvements—Big Sandy and Kentucky Rivers In It Too

Among the 1908 appropriations estimated by General McKenzie chief of engineers for the War Department, are the following:

- Ohio River—Lock and Dam No. 37, \$330,000.
- Locks and dams in Ohio river between Pennsylvania state line and Cincinnati, \$835,000.
- Big Sandy river and Levisa and Tug Forks, \$185,000.
- Kentucky—Kentucky river, \$519,000.
