**And \$300,000,000 to Finish Panama Canal Says Secretary Taft**

Secretary Taft in a statement Thursday before the Senate Committee on Inter-oceanic Canals, expressed the opinion that the ultimate cost of the Panama canal would be approximately \$300,000,000.

The work, he thought should be completed within six years from next July.

**LEBUS AND KEHOE**

At Vanceburg Today—Leaders in the Tobacco Cause Hustling.

Hon. Clarence Lebus, President of the Burley Tobacco Growers' Association, was on the C. and O. train yesterday morning en route to Vanceburg, where there will be a big Equity meeting today.

In a few minutes talk with The Ledger reporter Mr. Lebus declared that everything was going his way regarding the success of the Growers' fight, and that they would down the Tobacco Trust eventually; that the fight on the trust was one of self-defense on the part of the farmers, and that their cause is a just one.

He declared that the 1908 crop would be cut out altogether, and that the supply being thus reduced the increased demand would, of course, boom the price.

Fifteen cents a pound, straight, is the slogan and nothing less.

Hon. J. N. Kehoe joined Mr. Lebus at Vanceburg this morning to assist in the meeting.
