**OVER SIX THOUSAND**

Deaths From Consumption in Kentucky Last Year

The State Board of Health has presented its biennial report to the Governor.

The report shows that in the average year in Kentucky there are 11,979 cases and 6,438 deaths from tuberculosis; 22,512 cases and 1,683 deaths from typhoid fever; 16,317 cases and 1,835 deaths from the diarrheal diseases of childhood; 5,181 cases and 1,068 deaths from diphtheria; 22,383 cases and 938 deaths from dysentery and diarrhea in adults, and 1,360 cases and 69 deaths from scarlet fever.

The parties on trial were Hogan Gilbert, John Sloan and Bob Clayton, on a drunk and disorderly charge.

Mary Mills Clarkson was the colored Amazonian who figured as the main spoke in the proceedings. There was a three cornered fight and Mary was one of the most active participants, and from her testimony it was made plain that she can hold a full hand in a rough house with the best of them.
