### AGREEMENT

#### With Tobacco Trust—Society of Equity Organization in Ohio Opposed to Lawlessness

COLUMBUS, O., March 2d.—"There will be no barn burning in Ohio," said C. A. Windle Friday. He is National Organizer of the American Society of Equity, which has been brought into considerable prominence lately by the night riders of Kentucky.

"The alarm given about Brown county, Ohio, dangers is mostly wind and the greater part of the troubles in Kentucky are confined to the dark districts on the border of Tennessee.

"But there our society is not organized. The farmers have an organization, but it is entirely independent of the American Society of

Equity. Our society has reached an agreement with the American Tobacco Company and in the counties where our society is organized there is no trouble. The society does not countenance such things as barn burning and other kinds of lawbreaking. It does not have to."

Mr. Windle is in Columbus to start a statewide campaign to organize the farmers of Ohio into a branch of the Association.
