In a blazing livery barn at Newport a \$1,500 horse died after being rescued.

E. J. O'Brien & Co. of Louisville have purchased 240 hogheads of tobacco in Graves and McCracken counties at \$7 to \$11.50 per hundred. The lot totalled \$70,000.

At least 150 children were burned to death in the fire which destroyed the Lakewood School in Collingwood, Cleveland, O., Wednesday forenoon. Of the 360 in the school, the remainder escaped alive, many of them seriously burned and injured in the panic which followed the breaking out of the fire. The fire started in the basement of the school building.

McCHORD BILL

Giving State Absolute Control of Tobacco Business Passed the House

Hard Fight Ahead in the Senate

FRANKFORT, Ky., March 4th.—Tobacco growers of Kentucky won the first step in the fight for legislation, which they say, will assist them to restrain the "Iron Hand" of the so-called Tobacco Trust in the fight for higher prices, when the McChord bill passed the House by a vote of 66 to 21. The bill now goes to the Senate. The measure requires every buyer of tobacco in the state to secure license from the Commissioner of Agriculture under the penalty of a heavy fine. It gives the state absolute power over tobacco companies. The opponents made a hard fight on the ground that the bill is so drastic that it will drive large warehouses out of the state.

The Watkins school book bill, providing that the price of books used in schools in Kentucky be no higher than the lowest price charged for books of the same quality in other states, was passed by the Senate.

The substitute to the Wilhelm anti-poolroom bill, as agreed on by the Committee and Senator Wilhelm, passed the Senate by 33 to 4. Section 6 of the bill says: "This act shall not apply to the race tracks licensed by the State Racing Commission, nor to the trotting races conducted by regularly-organized associations."
