LEXINGTON, Ky., June 23d.—Colonel J. E. Delph, who has been a land broker in Lexington for nearly half a century, said today that since the passing of the Anti-Betting Bill in New York and the furtherance of the no-crop movement in the tobacco war, the price of farm lands in Central Kentucky has decreased 25%.
