In spite of the uproar, deaths and accidents of previous Fourths that urge a sadder observance of the day—and its various nights—the approaching battle with cannon crackers, toy pistols and fireworks promises the following results—

come to recognize the fact that it is not always the blank cartridge or percussion cap, but the dust and street dirt with which the hands are soiled that contain the tetanus bacillus or its spore. This dust is carried into the wound and is much more difficult to remove than a blank cartridge wad. Every Fourth of July injury should receive the same treatment as crushing injuries from streetcar accidents where it is known that the wound is infected with street dirt.
