Hon. James Campbell Cantrill of Scott county was nominated yesterday afternoon by the Seventh District Democratic Convention at Lexington for Congress. His was the only name presented to the Convention, those delegates who had been instructed for William Preston Kimball, the present Congressman, having a little while previously withdrawn from the Convention.
