**IMPORTANT IMPROVEMENT**

Resumption of Double Track Work on the C. and O. Ordered

George W. Stevens, President of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway, has issued orders for the resumption of the double-tracking work which was discontinued some months ago on account of the financial stringency then existing throughout the entire system.

An order has also been placed with the American Car and Foundry Company of Huntington, W. Va., for 200 assorted freight cars. This is in addition to the orders placed with the same concern last month.

When the double-tracking work is completed there will be a continuous double track throughout the congested line between Richmond and Newport News, with the exception of sixteen miles between Eiko and Walkers.

The road will also be double-tracked between Clifton Forge and Riverton, Ky., except for a small distance through West Virginia and Kentucky.

There are already double tracks between Orange and Washington.
