Sixteen-Year-Old Girl Dresses in White and Commits Suicide

Miss Berta Lee Hanks, aged 16 years, ended her life at the home of her parents near Ceraloo, Ky., by firing a bullet into her heart. She was a sufferer from melancholia.

Miss Hanks evidently went about the taking of her life in a deliberate manner, as she was dressed in white from head to foot.

She fired twice, the first shot failing to take effect. The fatal bullet entered below the heart, passing out under the right arm. Death was instantaneous.
