WILLIAM PUCCINI'S

Trial For Rape Continues at Brooksville—Accused Brought to Maysville Each Night For Safe Keeping

William Puccini, the young and good looking Bracken county man, a member of the Army, and arrested at Columbus, Ohio, for the alleged rape of a young woman in Bracken county, is now being tried at Brooksville and is taken from Maysville each morning during the trial in an auto and returned to the Maysville Jail at night in custody of Sheriff Mackey. Puccini denies that he assaulted the girl. She declares that he did and the present trial is arousing much interest and feeling in Bracken county.

The Augusta Chronicle, discussing the case, says:

"The victim of the alleged outrage is Miss Eleanor Moreland, daughter of John Moreland, aged 28 years, and the assault is said to have occurred on the night of January 28th, the warrant being issued on February 9th. The young lady in question has always borne a good reputation, and had been keeping company with the accused prior to this time.

"Puccini is 26 years of age, a son of Mayo Puccini, and his reputation has always been good.

"Robert Buckler of Mt. Olivet and County Attorney Kinney are representing the Commonwealth, while Attorneys Doniphan and Hargett are looking after the interests of the accused.

"The trial of Puccini began Wednesday morning, the testimony of Miss Moreland and Mrs. Jett, with whom she lived, occupying the most of the morning.

"The accused was brought to Brooksville from Maysville Wednesday morning in an automobile and will likely be returned there for safe keeping."

Regarded as Sure Appointee as Canal Zone Governor at \$14,000 a Year

WASHINGTON, March 24th.—It is reported here that M. H. Thatcher of Kentucky is sure to become Governor of the Canal Zone at \$14,000 a year, from which it is believed George Duttelle will remain as District Attorney at Louisville.

Riversmen will urge that the proposed new Kentucky and Indiana bridge at Louisville shall be built with a 700-foot channel span.

There are forty men at work on the Virginia, which was beached at Willow Grove, and it is thought she will be out at the same time her sister steamer, the Queen City, which will probably be ready to resume her trips in the Cincinnati-Pittsburgh trade about April 15th.

Big corporations opposed to the raising of the bridges spanning the Allegheny river, as proposed by the War Department, attacked the project on the ground that the fault with the river at present is not that navigation is obstructed by low bridges, but that the type of boats used on the rivers for the past 50 years is at fault, and that their design should be changed to accommodate the bridges rather than that the bridges be raised.

Instead of \$4,175,000 the Rivers and Harbors Bill is very likely to carry an appropriation of \$5,225,000 for the improvement of the Ohio river when it goes to President Taft for his signature. The Senate Committee on Commerce adopted the amendment proposed by Senator Burton, increasing the cash appropriation for the Ohio from \$1,900,000 to \$1,150,000, and the appropriation for continuing contracts from \$2,500,000 to \$3,500,000, a total increase of \$1,150,000.


