MAY CHANGE LINE

Through Dover—The C. and O., Trying to Eliminate Curves, May Run South of Dover

Ripley Bee.

The surveyors have been at work the past week surveying between South Ripley and Dover for a double track.

The route is to be changed somewhat, crossing Lee's creek near the old ford, passing through Dover back of Rosemont Cemetery, and continuing on down near the Fox Lane.

There is not room on the street where the road now runs for a double track, hence the change back of the town.

We beg to say that the Company already has a double track from one end of Dover to the other, which completely monopolizes Second street for half a mile. The plan of the Company is to eliminate curves and by changing the tracks a half mile South there will be three miles of straight tracks from South Ripley to the Bracken county line just below Dover.
