THE SQUARE DEAL MAN.

Mr. Robert V. Hodges of this city passed a very creditable examination and was admitted as a practicing Attorney by the Lewis Circuit Court Monday. The Examining Committee was composed of Judge Halbert and ex-Congressman Pugh of Vanceburg and Hon. A. D. Cole of Maysville.

The body of Harrison Poole, the ill-fated passenger drowned off the steamer Greendale while the boat was making a landing at Manchester, Ohio, May 15th, was caught yesterday afternoon near Springdale by Lewis Pelham and Jack McCarthy of this city. The deceased was 24 years old, married and a member of the Order of Redmen at Manchester. When found he had \$27.50 in his pockets. Coroner Charles Slack held an inquest and returned a verdict of accidental drowning. His remains were turned over to his brother, Andrew Poole, and were taken to Manchester and will be buried today in McKees graveyard.

Mr. Harvey G. Wells is home from Texas, where he went ten days ago accompanied by Mr. C. D. Wells and Mr. Earl Newell, both of whom are still sojourning in the Lone Star State. Mr. C. D. Wells bought a 320-acre farm 1 1/2 miles from Lipscomb and Mr. Newell is figuring on two sections of land containing 1,280 acres. Both gentlemen expect to locate permanently in Texas. Mr. Harvey Wells is also in receipt of a letter from Mr. P. L. Disher, formerly of Mason county, an excerpt of which follows: "I have located in Texas. I find this country is alright and I like it fine. Don't think anyone would make a mistake by locating here. The land is fine to cultivate, plenty of good water, and everything that heart could wish."
