SUCCESSFUL OPERATION

FILES ANOTHER SUIT

Mrs. Frances D. Brooks Makes the City Defendant Again For Alleged Damages to Her Property

Wednesday Mrs. Frances D. Brooks filed suit in the Mason Circuit Court against the City of Maysville.

The plaintiff in her petition recites that on the 16th day of July, 1910, and on or about July 27th, 1910, her residence in West Third street, occupied at the time by Mr. Patrick Sammons and family, was inundated by the overflow of a city sewer and her household goods destroyed, and greatly injuring said real estate.

She prays for damages in the sum of \$1,000.

This is the second suit brought against the city by Mrs. Brooks on practically the same arraignment.

In her first round in the Mason Circuit Court she was given a verdict for \$2,000, the case being appealed by the city and is now pending in the Court of Appeals.
