COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Council met in regular session Monday night, Mayor Lee in the chair.

The Mayor reported that he had collected during the past month \$4,248.65 for licenses issued.

Boe. W. D. Cochran, representing C. and O. Railway Co., appeared before Council and asked that the privilege of removing the stock pens from Third and Wood streets, Sixth Ward, to a site on the company's property East of Limestone street, be allowed. The request was granted, same to be approved by Proposition and Grievance Committee.	

The Maysville Water Co. presented an itemized bill amounting to \$152.37 for placing three fire plugs in Forest avenue. Referred to Water Committee.

The Maysville Amusement Co. petitioned Council to refund \$100 paid for license during carnival week. After discussion pro and con the motion to refund was lost by a 7 to 5 vote.

The building in East Third street opposite the L. and N. Depot—"Old Gold Flour Mill"—was cited as a nuisance and a danger spot owing to its dilapidated condition. On motion the matter was referred to the Board of Health and the Mayor was authorized to employ two mechanics to investigate the condition of the building.

The sewer on Fourth street was ordered completed.

A number of iron seats formerly used on Market street Esplanade were ordered placed in the children's playground, corner Second and Wall.

The matter of refunding J. P. Taylor & Co., \$65 taxes, claimed to have been erroneously assessed, was referred to Proposition and Grievance Committee to report back at next meeting of Council.

Member Everett reported that the Fire Committee had selected a Shank Motor Truck through Kirk & Kirk at a stipulated price of \$2,385, and body for same from Short & Kane at \$196. The Mayor and City Clerk were instructed to sign contracts for same. When fully equipped the new fire machine for the East End will cost in the neighborhood of \$3,100. Member Everett was instructed to look after a home for the machine, which is said to be ready for delivery about October 1st.

Member Fleming was appointed to notify the Amazon Fire Company of the ending of the old contract with the city and the contract now in force is from month to month.

The Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, together with Mayor and City Clerk were authorized to take up outstanding bonds in excess of surplus money on hand.

The Fitzgerald Co. of Lexington for balance due on construction of tarvia streets in East Fourth and West Third.

The Laws and Ordinance Committee was instructed to draw up an ordinance regulating and governing automobile horns—the book is to have the seal of approval.

The January street sewer having been completed the following prices will govern—sanitary tapping \$20, all other connections for drainage \$10.

Nothing further appearing Council adjourned.
