### Sales of Land.

The following changes in the ownership of land have been recorded at the office of the Clerk of the County Court since our last report:

Martha Suit and wife to P. W. Suit, five acres and two poles of land, near Sardis, consideration, \$550.  
M. S. McLean to Julius Martin, sixty-one acres and three rods of land, on Two Lick, consideration, grantees interest in another tract of land.

At the regular meeting of the Manufacturing and Immigration Society at the Council Chamber this evening at 7 1/2 o'clock, the annual Standing Committees will be appointed and a paper on the subject of "Tobacco Growing and the advantages of Maysville as a point for Manufacturing Tobacco," prepared by George R. Gill, esq., will be read. Everybody is invited to attend.

The bill granting certain rights and privileges to the Columbus and Maysville Railroad passed both houses of the Legislature on Saturday and was signed by the Governor the same day. An amendment providing that no other city, county or corporation, besides Maysville should subscribe stock to this road was made to the bill in the Senate and was accepted by the House. Mr. Robert A. Cochran, who went to Frankfort in the interest of the measure returned home Monday.

The arrangements for the ten-mile race over the Maysville Course next May for \$1,000 a side, by Miss Nellie Burke, of Omaha, and Miss Lillian Devere, of San Francisco, were completed this morning, and the race will certainly take place at the time named under the auspices of the Maysville Trotting Club. The Maysville track was selected in preference to that at Louisville, for the reason that it is a better one. The race will be the grand event of the season and the best and longest ever run in the state.

### Regulations for Lent.

1. All the faithful, over twenty-one and under sixty years of age, unless legitimately dispensed, are bound to observe the fast of Lent.

2. They are to make only one full meal a day (Sundays excepted), which meal should be taken about noon.

3. Both fish and flesh are not to be used at the same time, even by way of sauce or condiments.

4. A collation is allowed in the evening. No general rule as to the quantity of food permitted at this time is or can be made; but the practice of the most regular Christians is, never to let it exceed the fourth of an ordinary meal. The use of eggs, butter, cheese and milk at the evening collation, where this is the custom, is tolerated by the church only on account of the existence of such a custom.

5. General usage has made it lawful to take, in the morning, a cup of tea, coffee, or thin chocolate made of water, with a cracker.

6. The use of lard instead of butter is permitted in preparing fish, vegetables, etc.

7. The following are exempted from the obligation of fasting: Young persons under twenty-one years of age; those who have completed their sixtieth year; the sick, pregnant women, or those giving suck to infants; persons who are obliged to labor hard, and all who, through weakness, cannot fast without injury to their health.

8. By dispensation, the use of flesh meat is allowed at any time on Sundays, and once a day on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except of Ember Week, and on Thursday and Saturday of Holy Week.

9. Persons dispensed from the obligation of fasting are not bound by the restriction of using meat only at one meal on the days on which its use is granted by dispensation.

### Hall-Nesbitt

A prominent social event that has been looked forward to with great interest transpired at Owingsville, Bath county, Ky., this morning—the marriage of Miss Sallie Nesbitt, daughter of Hon. J. M. Nesbitt, the well known legal author and jurist, to Mr. Samuel M. Hall, of this city. The wedding ceremonies took place at half-past eight o'clock at the home of Judge Nesbitt in the presence of a large number of the relatives and friends of the family. The parties to the marriage are so well known that it is scarcely necessary to speak of the beauty and cultivation of the bride, nor of the high social station of both. The esteem in which they are held by their friends is attested by the large number of handsome and costly bridal presents received, a few of which a BULLETIN representative was permitted to see. The gift of the groom was an expensive set of diamonds, and of other friends in this city, a variety of articles of solid silver, costly bronze statuary, French china, and other gifts artistic and useful in character.

The ceremony was followed by an elegant wedding breakfast, after which Mr. and Mrs. Hall left on a bridal trip to the South where they will remain for several weeks, subsequently returning to this city where they will reside. ### The Culture of Tobacco.

A postal card from Mr. Geo. R. Gill informs us that the article on the subject of the growth of tobacco to which we alluded in a former issue of the BULLETIN is entirely distinct from the paper to be read before the M. & M. S. & I. society. Its title is "The origin and Culture of White Burley Tobacco," and is intended for the

information of those who know nothing about the culture of this type of tobacco. It is based upon Mr. Gill's own observations of the experience of the most successful planters in Mason county. The article is now in the hands of the Cultivator and County Gentleman, at Albany, N. Y., and will be published at once.

In reference to our suggestion to have the article elaborated and printed in a more durable form, we are authorized by Mr. Gill to say that if the farmers of Mason county will take the pains to note the time of sowing, the time of coming up of the seed, the date of setting out the plants, the cutting, quality of soil, account of cultivation, stripping, sorting, yield per acre, price received, etc, in short if some of them will take an interest in such things, will keep a perfect record of their crops from the seed bed to the breaks, and will send it to him, he will, this winter, collate the facts, compare the methods, and write a pamphlet on tobacco culture. Such a treatise as Mr. Gill will prepare we feel very sure will be interesting and of great value to every grower of tobacco. We trust our farmers will furnish him the information he will need in the preparation of such a work.
