DURING the month of May 141,035 immigrants landed at New York.

THE Interior department wants \$245,000 to complete the work on the tenth census.

THE President has appointed Government Directors of the Union Pacific Railroad.

THE total production of gold in the United States, for 1881, was \$34,700,000; of silver, \$43,000,000.

THE New York Evening Post says "the general opinion is that the outflow of gold for this season is over."

LICENSE fees by commercial travelers to the city of New Orleans for 1881 are to be refunded, the city ordinance having been declared unconstitutional.

FOR members of the Tariff Commission, the President has nominated Wm. H. McMahon, of New York, and Alex. R. Boteler, of West Virginia, vice Wheeler and Phelps, declined.

SAYS the Lexington Transcript: Charles Dudley Warner says that a great many men are too poor to subscribe for newspapers, but not one has yet been discovered who don't know how to run one.

CLIFTON R. BRECKINRIDGE, son of the late General John C. Breckinridge, was nominated for congressman at large, by the Democratic state convention, in session at Little Rock, Ark., on Saturday.

THE Georgetown Sentinel says "the latest rumor regarding the C. G. & P. Railroad is that the Blaine party will buy it, and use it in connection with the Ohio River Road." The route is twenty-two miles shorter between Cincinnati and Portsmouth than the river route, and fifteen miles shorter than the C. & C.

WM. NASH has been arrested at Portsmouth charged with the murder of Man-kin Grouins, a farmer at Ohio Furnace, July 4th, 1874. Nash, his father and brothers were in town, returning home intoxicated from Iron-ton, and meeting Grouins stoned him to death. They immediately fled and Wm. Nash is the first of the party captured.

THE Washington Capital says, when John Sherman "first came to Congress and was a candidate for Speaker the late Henry D. Cook carried about a subscription paper to make up a sum to enable John to continue his candidacy on the ground that he was a poor man. Since then, on a salary of five thousand a year, he has swelled into a millionaire. Not only this, but all the collateral branches of the Sherman family have prospered in the same mysterious way."

NEWS BREVITIES.

General DeCissey, of France, is dead. Mrs. John Siferd suicided at Logansport, Ind.

Burglars got in their work Sunday at Shiloh, O.

Hon. George H. Chapman, of Indianapolis, is dead.

The number of immigrants to this country in May was 141,035.

Two murderers were lynched at Rice, Kan., Friday morning.

A son of Martin McNeil was killed by a pony at Walnut Ridge, Ark.

Lewis, a ten-year-old son of James Shaw, was drowned at Gallipolis, O.

Moses Steddom was probably fatally gored by a bull at Lebanon, O.

Robert Kirkpatrick was killed by a runaway accident at Cleveland, O.

There are seven thousand homeopathic physicians in the United States.

A Mrs. Logan, of Lancaster, Ky., committed suicide by shooting herself.

Willis Crary, cashier of a bank at Paxton, Ill., was drowned while bathing.

Mrs. Lucy Brown was accidentally shot and killed by her son at Rock Creek, O.

The crop prospects are working a beneficial influence on trade in New York city.

Alarming rumors come from Northern Dakota of the appearance of grasshoppers.

Shelley Robey, the "Elephant King," a noted menagerie trainer, died at Lancaster, O.

A pension certificate forger was found guilty at Fort Wayne, Ind., and fined \$1,000.

A woman and five children were drowned in a branch of Sugar Creek, Linn county, Kansas.

Central Kentucky is breeding fine horses for Europe, Nova Scotia, and the rest of mankind.

A man named Wells had his back broken at Stevens' Mine, near Knightsville, Ind.

The funeral of ex-Governor Dennison took place at Columbus, Saturday afternoon.

A Lexington, Ky., clothing firm, of small capital, assigned; Cincinnati parties principal creditors.

The jury in the case of John Roxbury, indicted for manslaughter at Wellsville, O., failed to agree.

Two boys, named Frank Thomas and John Calahan, were drowned while fishing near Urbana, O.

Reuben Russell was kicked in the abdomen by a horse at Gallipolis, Ohio, and died soon afterward.

The honorary title of LL.D. has been conferred on Prof. Maria Mitchell, of Vassar College and Observatory.

A passenger on a railroad near Parkersburg, W. Va., upset Friday, and killed two persons, beside injuring many others.

An accident on the Clarksburg and Western railroad, West Virginia, resulted in the death of two persons and the injury of sixteen others.

J. W. Bubee, the bucket shop man arrested several days ago for swindling parties out of \$50,000, escaped from the officers at Springfield, Ill., Friday.

It is mentioned that while the late Gov. Dennison was in the gubernatorial chair, Ohio, sent forth 78,000 soldiers for three years, and 22,000 for three months.

SERGEANT Mason's counsel have prepared a review of the case to lay before the President, with a view to have the sentence revised.

THE House committee on foreign affairs has recommended the appropriation of \$50,000 for an exhibit at the fish exhibition in London, in 1883.

THE Japanese Indemnity Bill, as passed by the Senate directs the President to pay Japan \$785,000 without making any appropriation for the purpose.

LARUE county has produced a pair of human midgits that are great curiosities. Mrs. D. F. Ragland recently gave birth to a pair of twins, both girls, that weighed two and a quarter and one and three-quarter pounds respectively. Both are alive and kicking.
