THE fall of the bridge pier was not occasioned by imperfect masonry work but by the undermining of the foundation. It is the opinion of persons capable of judging that a pier that will stand never can be built on the present site.

THE fall session of the Washington Male and Female Institute begins next Monday, the 14th inst., with Mr. W. N. Parry as principal and Miss Lutie Mefford, assistant. Both are well qualified as teachers and are sure to be useful to the Washington community. The charges for tuition are as reasonable as can be desired.

**Minutes of the Kentucky Christian Missionary Convention.**

THURSDAY MORNING.

At 9 a. m., the convention engaged in a service of song after which Brother G. W. Yancey read the 23rd Psalm and led in prayer.

The minutes were read and approved. The committee reported Cynthiana as the place, and the last Tuesday in August, as the time for holding the next annual convention. The first session to be held at 7:30 p. m.

Miscellaneous business was called up and a letter from Ex-Gov. Fisk, of Covington, was read in relation the church edifice at Washington, D. C.

Bro. Briney moved that the State Board take such steps in the matter as they may see fit to induce the brotherhood to assist the church financially.

A motion to reconsider this was made and lost.

A letter from brother H. M. Ayres was read and referred to the State Board.

A communication was received from the Woman's Missionary Board.

A vote of thanks to the Maysville church and citizens for hospitality. Also to railroad and steamboats for favors in reduction of fare.

Brother McGarvey moved to print 5,000 copies of the minutes and distribute them to the subscribers of the mission fund and other brothers in the State. Action deferred until afternoon session.

At 10:30 brother C. L. Loos addressed the convention on the subject, "Preaching Christ."

After song and short addresses by Brothers Mueller, Munnell and Perkins, and benediction by brother Cleve, the convention adjourned.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**

Assembled at 2:30, and opened with song and prayer by Elder W. A. Morrison.

The motion of Bro. McGarvey relating to the publication of minutes, made at the morning session, was taken up and carried.

On motion of Bro. McGarvey, the women's Board of Missions was requested to furnish report of the proceedings for publication.

The convention was addressed by Bro. Dearborn, of Virginia, on Money and the Bible.

His right leg was cut off near the hip. The unfortunate man was removed to the alms house where he received every attention his situation required. He died about seven o'clock the same evening.

**"Unsanctified" Still in Doubt.**

ED. DAILY EVENING BULLETIN:—For information, not for anything of the burlesque, did "Unsanctified" write. Perhaps his communication should have its cause found in an erroneous (?) idea that sanctification was impossible in this world. For to be sanctified is to be holy, i. e. free from all sin, and more. But David is in part to blame for the idea, for he says (Ps. xiv:3) "there is none that doeth good, no, not one;" which the writer of the epistle to the Romans so interprets, "there is none righteous, no, not one," (Rom. iii:10.) But surely to be sinless is to be righteous, and surely one may not be holy without doing much good, having much righteousness. But Paul, whom your "C. M." correspondent twice quotes, and who of all men one would esteem sanctified, or with little of sin, testifies of him thus, "for the good that I would, I do not, but the evil I would not, that I do," (Rom. vii:19.) and further in the same connection says, that in him "dwelleth no good thing," (Ib. 18.) but that sin dwelleth in him. Then because of this thing, in great lamentation he breaks forth, "O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death." (Ib. 24.)

Again others are in part responsible for Unsanctified's error (?) The writers of both the Old and New Testaments speak of the Christ as "The Holy One of Israel" and the Holy One of God! Could they have intended to say an Holy One? But further, if this corruptible may be clothed with holiness, why must it put off its corruption? And since holiness is immortal, what is the explanation of the paradox death and immortality? But also lay the blame on the pure old man of Ephesus, who wrote when his hair was whitened by many years of loving service. "Who shall not fear thee, O Lord, and glorify thy name? for thou only art holy," (Rev. xv:4.)

Enoch and Elijah though laying no claim to sanctification were translated, how is it with the entirely sanctified of modern development, do they get justice? Is not holiness entitled to an immediate heaven?

But maybe your C. M. correspondent means after all justification i. e., the re-establishment of the proper relation between God and man, and a being sanctified, for afterward when "Death is swallowed up in victory" entire sanctification will doubtless ensue. If so I comprehend.

Pardon my length, and get your C. M. correspondent to straighten out my devotional path, for without hope in this world of being made otherwise, I still remain Yours, UNSANCTIFIED.
