The statements of both sides are given elsewhere, and, viewed in the light of either, Judge Hargis' position is an unenviable one.

Old Citizen's Gone.

Mr. Peter Lashbrooke one of the oldest citizens of the county, and a man widely known and generally respected, died at his residence near Lewisburg on Sunday morning at eleven o'clock, at the age of ninety years. He was a soldier during the war of 1812, and was the last of the veterans of this county. He was at one time a member of the Legislature and served for many years as a Justice of the Peace. The funeral will take place from his residence to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, after services by Rev. Jos. C. Frank, of the Christian church.

Rev. Wm. E. Sedden, for many years a minister of the M. E. Church, died this morning about three o'clock at his home in this county, at the age of seventy-five years. He was born in Virginia and came to Maysville about the year 1820. He filled the office of Mayor of Maysville and was for several years Justice of the Peace. A wife and two children survive him. The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock.
