"THE BARBER OF SEVILLE."

That the interest of music lovers in this community should be thoroughly aroused would seem certain. For Manager Dinelli of the Winchester Opera House has secured for Saturday, November 7, The John Dunsmore Opera Company in "The Barber of Seville."

This is the first time in this or any other country that Rossini's masterpiece has ever been presented in English, though it has been presented over 600 times in Paris and 400 times in New York in the original Italian. The name of Rossini stands as the high mark of merit in musical compositions, while the book by Beaumarchais is replete with excellent comedy. Heading the company will be found Mme. Monti Baldini, formerly prima donna of Hammerstein's Manhattan Opera Company, and John Dunsmore, pleasantly remembered for his connection with the "Bostonians."

"The Barber of Seville" is unique in the field of comic opera, inasmuch as its presentation calls for a cast almost entirely of principals. At the Winchester Opera House Saturday, November 7.

CHANGE IN BUSINESS PLANS.

Of the Catholic Church in the United States.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 4.—The change in the business procedure of the Catholic Church in this country, by which it passes from the jurisdiction of the Propaganda Fide and its bishops are placed on the same basis as those of other important countries, goes into effect today. In future every Catholic archbishop and bishop in the United States will appoint a personal representative of his diocese in Rome, and all business to be transacted directly with the Vatican will pass through his hands.

The great advantage of the new condition of things will be that the business of the church in America will be hastened.
