## JUDGE BENTON AND JUDGE HAYS SPEAK

Latter Talks on Streets of Nicholasville and His Rival in Courthouse.

NICHOLASVILLE, Ky., Dec. 22.—Interest here is centered in the race for Circuit Judge and both candidates, Hon. J. M. Benton and Hon. J. Smith Hays, addressed a court day crowd yesterday. An announcement was made more than a week ago that Judge Benton would speak at the court house this afternoon in the interest of his race.

Without previous announcement Mr. Hays spoke on the street yesterday morning for an hour or more. Among other things he said that inasmuch as he could not speak in the court house he would talk on the street, but those who have charge of the court house state that he did not ask for the use of it. He spoke of Judge Benton's asking for an increase of salary several years ago. His uncle, former Attorney General N. B. Hays, was also here in the interest of his candidacy.  
As previously announced, Judge Benton addressed the Democratic voters in the Circuit room. The room was packed, for Judge Benton is popular here. He was not introduced to his audience, as he is personally acquainted with the majority of the men who were present. He spoke for an hour and held his crowd throughout.

He opened his speech by telling of his early associations with Jessamine county; gave a sketch of his record as judge, said he is making the race on a high plane, and indulged in no personalities whatever as to his opponent. The crowd was one of the most enthusiastic ever assembled in the court room, and the judge was frequently interrupted with cheers and applause.

Judge Benton arrived this morning from Richmond and spent the morning in mingling with the voters and greeting friends. After the speaking an informal reception was held before he drove to Lexington to catch the Chesapeake and Ohio train to Winchester. Judge Benton was delighted with his reception here yesterday, and his friends express confidence that he will not lose fifty of the fifteen or sixteen hundred Democratic voters in this county. The primary will be held December 31.
