CONGRESSMAN LANGLEY AS SEEN BY THE PRESS

\$100,000 BUILDING FOR JACKSON

We are pleased to learn that Congress has appropriated \$100,000 for a Federal and Postoffice building in Jackson; for which we owe our Congressman, Hon. John W. Langley, the laurels. While the question is being asked by America what to do with Roosevelt. May not Breathitt and surrounding counties ask what shall we do with Langley?

As to politics, The News expects to be as blind as a bat to all but right, but we wish to say that so far Mr. Langley has carried out every promise he made before his election. He promised us a federal court, we have it, he promised to do all in his power to secure an appropriation for a Federal building, and it has recently been done. So when we get an office that does all the people ask him what more could any one want? Shall we lay him aside or keep him or future benefit?—Breathitt County News, Dem., June 24, 1910.

LANGLEY WILL STAY IN WASHINGTON

Representative Langley was invited to be a member of the congressional party to visit Panama at the expense of the Government and inspect the progress of the work on the canal. He decided, however, to remain in Washington, in the belief that he may be of some assistance in the effort to get some Senate amendments to the tariff bill which will, he thinks, be more beneficial to Kentucky industries than the provisions of the Payne bill as it passed the House. He says that he and others are not entirely satisfied with that bill voted by the organization to put it through the House, with the understanding that if certain amendments could be obtained in the Senate, the House organization could not oppose them in conference and he says that he had concluded to remain here to see that the "goods" delivered. — Courier-Journal April 17, 1909.

APPROVE LANGLEY'S BILL.

Representative Langley's bill, providing pensions for State Civil War soldiers, through proof of disability under the old law, and in cases where they have served at least ninety days, giving them pensionable status under the laws of 1890 and 1907, has met with the approval of his own, Kansas and other Republican members. With Mr. Langley they will go before the committee next week and make an argument for a favorable report on the bill. — Courier-Journal, Jan. 28, 1908.

WANTS BONA FIDE KENTUCKIANS.

Some interesting developments are expected as the result of Representative John W. Langley's investigation of the list of Civil Service employees that are charged to the State of Kentucky.

To begin with Langley has discovered that Kentucky has only 60 per cent. of her apportionment, while the District of Columbia has ten times its quota, Virginia eight times, and a number of other States considerably more than their allotted number under the law.

In addition to this, he has learned that a number of clerks that are credited to Kentucky never saw the State except on a map.

Langley is corresponding with people on the supposed residences of the Kentucky Government employees. After he has completed his work, he will submit the list to the Civil Service Commission, and ask that those who have secured places through false representation as to their residence be dismissed.

When he takes this action he will propose a very troublesome question for the commission. It will be up to the commission to decide whether it is proper claim for a residence is sufficient cause for dismissal. The progress of Langley's effort is being watched with interest by the members of Congress.—Washington Special of June 17, 1910.

HAS SECURED MOST.

The records will show that Congressman Langley has secured more appropriations for his section of the State than all his predecessors from the Tenth district put together since the Civil War. For the improvement of the Licking, Kentucky and Big Sandy rivers he secured appropriations altogether amounting to \$1,250,000. Another quarter of a million dollars he secured for public buildings in the Tenth district, which appropriation included \$100,000 for a public building at Jackson. Beside

these material points of his labors, Mr. Langley has gotten through Congress several important bills for the benefit of his constituents. One of these provided for a United States District Court at Jackson, another provided for a fifteen days' vacation once a year with traveling expenses for employees of the revenue service. — Lexington Leader, Rep., July 5, 1910.

OPEN ENDORSEMENT OF DEMOCRATIC ORGAN.

Congressman Langley has taken up and carried through more important measures for the public good during his two terms than any member of the National House within our recollection. The many salutary measures and appropriations advanced and carried through under his personal aid and supervision are too numerous and well known to justify a lengthy recital of them in this article.

His recent nomination to succeed himself, without the least opposition was the harmonious result of a deliberative body of Republicans, who met in convention in this city June 3, 1910. It was a unit and its determination showed conclusively what esteem and confidence he is held as a public servant.—Mt. Sterling Advocate, (Democrat) July 20, 1910

CARRIES FIGHT TO SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Representative-elect John W. Langley is carrying the fight for an appropriation for the Big Sandy river into the Senate. Having failed in the House, he arranged today for a hearing before the Senate Committee on Commerce.

When the river and harbor bill reaches the Senate he will ask several prominent citizens of Kentucky to appear with him before the committee. "Get your ammunition ready, I am for you in this fight," said Senator Elkins, Chairman of the Senate committee, whose State (West Virginia) borders on the Tug Fork of the Big Sandy.

OUR CONGRESSMAN.

The Hon. John W. Langley is certainly making good as the Representative of the Tenth Kentucky District in the National Congress. The past week he has been pushing his bill to put on the pensionable list those who participated in the Union side in the Civil War that are not on the regular rolls. He also secured the past week an appropriation to reimburse Clark county for the cost of a bridge over Upper Howards creek. But the thing that has given him the most popularity was his vote to sustain the President in the secret service matter.—Winchester Star-Sentinel, Jan. 21, 1910.
