REVENGE AND NOT ROBBERY

Is Believed to Have Been the Motive for the Murder of Four Persons on Bernhard Farm.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 15.—Revenge and not robbery is now believed to have been the motive for the murder of four persons on the Bernhard farm south of here. The bodies were examined closely Sunday and it was found that Mrs. Emeline Bernhard and her son George had been terribly beaten about the head, while the hired man, known as Tom Morgan, but identified Saturday as James Graves, from a small town in Oregon, evidently had been killed with one or two blows.

Edward P. Boyle, head of the Kansas City Detective Bureau, Saturday took charge of the hunt for the man or men who committed the crime, and it is expected an arrest will be made within a few days.

In the inspection of the premises Inspector Boyle found the bloody imprints of four fingers and a thumb of a man's left hand upon the white-washed wall of the closet in which it is believed Mrs. Bernhard was murdered. Inspector Boyle also found the handle of a pickax hidden under the manger in which three men were found. This was covered with blood and hair. Inspector Boyle stated that the first step will be to locate six men, all of whom have recently worked on the Bernhard farm. When they are located the imprints of their left hands will be taken and compared with the bloody finger prints found on the white wall of the closet.

Another search was made of the house and a strong box in which valuable papers and some money had been placed was found. In this box a deed conveying all of Mrs. Bernhard's property to her son George was found. From this the officers believe she intended to leave all of her property to him and cut off her other children. The deed was drawn Nov. 9, 1909, but never had been filed. A bank book shows that Mrs. Bernhard opened an account with a bank about a year ago and had more than \$3,000 on deposit.

KENTUCKY BANKERS

Adopt Seal of Reward for Capture of Swindlers.

LOUISVILLE, Dec. 15.—Kentucky bankers have declared against forgers and swindlers, and at a meeting here Wednesday adopted a resolution providing for a seal of rewards for the pursuit, capture and prosecution of persons swindling or attempting to swindle a bank in the commonwealth.

A change in the bank burglary bonding companies carrying this class of insurance was also discussed, but was held over until the next meeting so that data affecting bonding rates could be secured in the meantime.

BLOODY BATTLE LAST SUNDAY

Mexican Revolutionists Are Defeated and Nearly One Hundred Are Killed.

EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 15.—In Sunday's engagements the revolutionists fought Gen. Navarro to a standstill, although inferior in numbers. All told 74 persons are known to have been killed.

Navarro took no prisoners. It is contrary to his orders, and in his camp there were no wounded of the other side. The bayonet completed the work of the bullet.

A horrible instance of the barbarity of the campaign occurred after the battle, when every man in the hamlet of Cerro Prieto was brought before the mayor to prove his innocence of participation in the revolt. Thirty could not do this and they were taken out and shot. They are included in the number of the dead.

Navarro places his own dead at a captain, lieutenant and 12 soldiers. Twenty-seven of his men, including two officers, were severely wounded. Among the latter is Gen. Brandon, special correspondent of the Mexican Herald, and a resident of Panama. Brandon is the champion middle-weight wrestler of Mexico.

Five insurgents who ran out of ammunition and surrendered were bayoneted.

The battle was indecisive in its results. It occurred at the village of Cerro Prieto, a hundred miles west of Chihuahua.
