ATTORNEY FARRELL.

Assaulted by Jailer Wm. H. Wilkerson at Lexington, Ky., March 31.—Jailer Wm. H. Wilkerson, who was defeated for renomination in Monday's primary, Tuesday night struck Commonwealth's Attorney Edward P. Farrell in the left eye with his fist, breaking the attorney's glasses, knocking them off and badly bruising his eye. Farrell was a friend to Wilkerson in his campaign, and did a great deal of work for him. When they met on the street tonight Wilkerson asked him if he had not done him wrong in certain details of the management of his part of the campaign. The attorney replied that he had not, and with that, it is said, Wilkerson struck the blow. Farrell was stunned and badly dazed, and Wilkerson, it is said, stepped back and, drawing a revolver, said he thought it would be best to kill the attorney. The attorney, being unarmed and at a disadvantage after his glasses were off, insisted that Wilkerson ought not to shoot, and the jailer allowed the attorney to depart.

J. M. Gentry defeated Wilkerson Tuesday for the silver count in nomination for jailer by 169 majority.

IN SESSION.

Blackburn and Thompson Give Their Testimony Before the Bribery Committee. FRANKFORT, Ky., March 31.—The bribery investigating committee was in session Tuesday afternoon and heard the testimony of several witnesses in regard to the charges against Representative Baird. Ex-Senator Blackburn testified that Mr. Baird, last winter that he had been offered money to vote for Dr. Hunter, and this statement was corroborated by Representative A. D. Thompson. The committee was instituted for political purposes, and its object has become so plain that the investigation is likely to have any effect on the senatorial election.

The Senate Passes Its First Bill—Little Business Transacted in the House. HARRISBURG, Ky., March 31.—The threat to dynamite the homes of the president and directors of the Cornishville mine has caused the gates on the road to be thrown open, and a notice was posted in all that Cornishville giving warning that flour must not be sold at over \$2 per 100 pounds. The mill is owned by J. H. Violett, and a gentleman from Anderson county says that a large number of tobacco bales have been destroyed and notices left that the mill should be permitted to raise any tobacco.

Girl's Brother Shows Her Love. NICHOLASVILLE, Ky., March 30.—Sammie Gill and John Johnson met near the home of the former in the lower part of this county, and a shooting scrape, in which 15 shots were fired, ensued. He was ordered to stay away from the girl home, and became angry at Sam as being responsible for the shooting. Tyler was on hand, and rushed up and declared that he had heard so, and struck James blows in the breast and stomach. James was a little staggered, but got back and reached as if to get his gun, but it was caught by Carroll and other bystanders. James was also restrained, and for a few minutes excitement was high.
