THOMPSONVILLE, Ky., June 15.—The jury in the Nick Ray case rendered a verdict Monday at 2:30 p. m. for life imprisonment. Ray seemed somewhat relieved when the verdict was read, but remained deathly pale. His aged father, Joseph Ray, could hardly bear up under his grief. Ray was immediately removed to jail, where a wife and some took place. His wife came to him and learning the verdict, fainted, and now lies prostrate with grief. A letter received here from Mr. William Cooper, dated Florence, Italy, June 5, says: "It seems that all the models belonging to Mr. Hart were left with the artist, and he has since destroyed them. Mr. Hart's death many of the models were destroyed, that of the statue, 'Woman Triumphant,' being among them. British Columbia Development Co. to Develop Top Central Alaska.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 15.—The British Columbia Development Co., an association, one of the largest corporations in the west, has completed arrangements for constructing a railway to the gold fields of Central Alaska from St. Michaels to that over Skagway bay. The pass, at this latter point, is 2,000 feet lower than Chilkoot pass, and is more accessible. Worthington Monday afternoon commuted the death sentence of Edward Ray, of Clark county, who was to have been hanged at Winchester Tuesday, and young Kelley will spend the remainder of his life in the penitentiary along with his father, John Kelley, who is also sentenced for life for complicity in the same offense.

READY TO SUPPLY THE TRADE.

Nearly everybody living in the city was awakened by the concussion, and Mrs. Lucy Anderson, who lives in this county on the Georgetown pike, was so badly frightened that she was unable to get up. COURT OF APPEALS.

FRANKFORT, Ky., June 15.—The court of appeals Wednesday decided one case. No action was taken until Saturday in the case of Claxton, involving \$81,000. The question in the case was whether the creditors of the Filley Steel works, owned by the Filley and Steel works, and Newport, should have \$81,000 worth of the assets of the steel works. The court decided that the steel works were to draw the money from the assets of Harper, who was president of both, and that Harper himself, and not the steel works, having received the money, and the creditors of the bank must look to Harper and his bondsmen, and not the steel works for reimbursement, unless it can be proven that the steel works actually used the money in its business.

A FALL OUT.

FRANKFORT, Ky., June 15.—At Turkeyfoot, this county, Garland Johnson shot and killed Kirby Smith. Both are well known young men. Johnson conducts a general store at Turkeyfoot, and it is said Smith owed him an account, and being refused payment, he shot him. Johnson claims that between 5 and 6 o'clock Tuesday afternoon Smith and three of his brothers, all armed, rode by his store carrying shot guns, and to the door, and they attempted to draw their weapons, when he got the drop on them, and fired four shots, one of which struck Kirby, who fell dead.

Steady Brown for Collector.

FRANKFORT, Ky., June 15.—It is reported here that Geo. Bradley, who is now in Colorado Springs, will shortly visit Washington, and with Foraker and Sherman, will make a strong effort for Stanley Brown for collector of the Fifth Kentucky district, and will try to knock out Sapp, Deboe's candidate. Sherman has been for Brown since he was removed from the office here by Collector Backner for making a strong fight to carry Kentucky for Sherman in the national convention eight years ago.
