DESPERATE DEED.

Dan Hayes Deliberately Shoots Brother Martin at Woodlandsville.

WOODLANDSVILLE, Ky., Aug. 30.—Dan Hayes entered the store of John Martin, pretending to buy a pair of shoes.

While Martin was getting change from the safe Hayes drew a revolver and demanded his money. Martin told him to wait a minute and he went to the keys, when Hayes fired and struck Martin in the forehead, the ball ranging out at the side. A posse of men scoured the woods and captured Hayes at Hill Creek, two miles from here, and lodged him in jail.

Martin is severely wounded. Hayes is out on \$5,000 bail.

State His Mother's Cow.

IRVING, Ky., Aug. 30.—Ellisworth McGraw and Bert Holsinger are fugitives from justice and warrants are out for their arrest. McGraw is a desperate character and has a long record for shooting his own brother. Young Holsinger has respectable parents who own a little farm three miles south of this place. McGraw had up for money young Holsinger was persuaded by McGraw to steal a young cow from Holsinger's own mother, which he did. They took the animal to Catlettsburg and sold it for \$15. Holsinger's parents will have both boys prosecuted.

Want Wages Weekly Instead of Monthly.

OWENSBORO, Ky., Aug. 30.—The miners at the Deaneville and Thompson coal mines at Deaneville, Ohio county, have struck on account of dissatisfaction to the time of paying wages. They are satisfied with the 24 cent rate, but want weekly instead of monthly settlements. Each mine employs about 40 men, and the differences will probably be adjusted to the satisfaction of both sides.
