A SPEECH ON ANARCHY.
Recorder Goff's Utterance Before New York Club Are Attracting Attention.

Recorder Goff has just made an address before the Nineteenth Century Club upon "Anarchy," which is attracting considerable attention at New York. In part the recorder said: "For us who are gathered here in this well-appointed and beautifully decorated chamber, under the glare of these electric lights, it is perfectly proper to agree that anarchy is abominable. We did not. We are all well dressed and neatly combed for us to take the position of the party in possession. "I think we assume a little too much if we make the mistake of congratulating ourselves on the present state of our society or our position in it. The aristocracy and nobility of France took the same position before the revolution in regard to what they called their rights. But it was their lives which caused the revolution. The nobles amused themselves in luxury and wealth while the people starved. Who were the anarchists? The people or the nobles?"

Recorder Goff said that in our efforts to revise legislation for repressing anarchy, we are in a very dangerous endeavor to repress an idea. If the idea is right it will triumph, and the repressive methods will prove only so much fuel to feed the flames. When wrong ideas die of themselves, we are dealing with anarchy let us remember that if our government is founded on righteousness then anarchy is a crime and our duty as citizens is to suppress it. The world's history has shown that anarchy is a crime.

REVOLUTION OF PLANETS.
Joseph Battell, Novelist and Philosopher, Says Force of Sun's Light is the Cause.

That the revolution of the earth and other planets about the sun is caused by the force of the sun's light moving through the vacuum between the spheres and more or less affected by magnetic currents is the claim of Joseph Battell, novelist and philosopher of Montclair, N. J., who claims to have made a careful study of the problem. Mr. Battell said in regard to his theory: "The interstellar space is a vast region into which the air does not extend, and, therefore, is similar to what we call a vacuum. But it is demonstrated by the experiments of Prof. J. J. Thompson, of Oxford university, England, and other eminent physicists, that in a vacuum cathode rays, light, heat and electricity do their work, and it is shown that these particles or corpuscles of light not only move with great rapidity in straight lines, but will cause to move rapidly in a vacuum bodies which they meet in their path. "It follows, as a matter of absolute certainty, that the light emitted from the sun into the space surrounding it must cause to move whatever bodies are in its path. This means especially the earth and other planets of what we call the solar system. Light moving in straight lines will push these bodies away from the sun. This is the accelerated force of repulsion. It is further demonstrated that magnetic currents will deflect or bend the rays of light from a straight to a curved course. Let these two forces be properly adjusted and the revolution of planets about their central sun is accounted for."

TALKS ABOUT MONEY
Mr. Andrew Carnegie Addresses Railroad Y. M. C. A. Men.

Declares Best of Wealth is Not What It Does for the Owner, But What It Enables Him to Do for Others.

Andrew Carnegie was the principal speaker at the twenty-sixth anniversary of the railroad branch of the Young Men's Christian association at New York. He talked of wealth, its acquirement and uses. He said: "The best of wealth is not what it does for the owner, but what it enables him to do for others. And let me tell you there is nothing in money beyond having a competence, nothing but the satisfaction of being able to help others. "It is one of the most cheering facts of our days that under present conditions the wages of labor tend to rise and the price of necessities to fall. There was never a nation so splendidly situated as ours is at this moment in regard to labor. Every sober and capable and willing man finds employment at wages which, with thrift and a good wife to manage, will enable him to go far toward buying up a competence for old age. "Every man who has, almost without intention or desire, had himself loaded with somewhat more than a competence tell me soberly that what one has beyond this brings little or nothing but trouble and discomfort. What all of you should strive for is a competence, without which, Junius has said, no man can be happy. No man should be happy without it, if it be within reach, and I urge all of you to save a part of your earnings these prosperous days and put it in savings banks at interest, or better still, buy a home with it. "It took me some time to learn, but I did learn that the supremely great managers, such as you have seen here, never do any work to speak of themselves; their point is to make other work while they think. I apply this lesson to the life so that I work and I did the laughing, and I commend to your superintendents the thought that there is little success where there is little laughter. "Carnegie predicted that in the near future railroad trains will run 100 miles an hour. The speaker commended the care some railroads are giving their employees, and handed out some resolutions and the reading and club rooms which some roads are establishing. He said these benefited shareholders as well as workers, and that the latter is a great delusion to say that capital and labor are foes; they must be allies or neither succeed."

THE DEFENSE RESTS.
The Prosecution in the Howard Trial Gives Rebuttal Testimony.

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 23.—The defense rested its case in the Jim Howard trial Wednesday and the state began its rebuttal testimony. Several witnesses were introduced to show that Howard's principal alibi witness, H. C. Robertson, had said that he was at the gate of the Capitol square when Howard was shot, and saw him fall. Robertson claimed to have been on the board of Trade Hotel with Howard when the shot was fired. Numerous witnesses also contradicted Howard's story as to his whereabouts on the night following the shooting. The evidence will be concluded Thursday and the case will go to the jury Friday night or Saturday morning.

Thrown From His Horse.
Scottsville, Ky., Jan. 23.—John Roark, charged with shooting at the depot and illegally selling liquor, and held to the grand jury was on route here Wednesday, when his horse became frightened and threw him, dragging him some distance. Physicians fear he can not recover.

To the Penitentiary for Life.
Louisville, Ky., Jan. 23.—Clements Descher was found guilty of the murder of a woman and sentenced to the penitentiary for life. There was some doubt as to his sanity, and this saved him from the gallows.

Renewed an Old Quarrel.
Cattlemans, Ky., Jan. 23.—Near Philville, according to a report that reached here, Squire Gilbert Bentley and Riley Ramo renewed an old quarrel in which Bentley was shot and killed. Bentley died as he was dying, but his shots were wild.

Will Not Retire From Turf.
Lexington, Ky., Jan. 23.—W. T. Muir, the well-known young turfman who sold out his entire racing stable to O. H. Chenault, denies that he will retire from the thoroughbred business to train trotters.

Killed by a Buzz Saw.
Campton, Ky., Jan. 23.—Conner brought the report Wednesday morning that Sam Pence, of Lane, this county, was killed Tuesday by falling against a buzz saw of the Standard Oil Co. on Holly Creek.

Bank of Hartford Robbed.
Hartford, Ky., Jan. 23.—The bank of Hartford, according to a report that reached here, was robbed Wednesday of \$2,500 and \$3,500 by four men, who blew open the safe with dynamite and escaped after a fight with the deputy sheriff and some citizens.

Found the Lost Grave.
Scottsville, Ky., Jan. 23.—The grave of the infant son of George W. Perry, who came to Kentucky from Virginia in 1795 and established the first church in southwestern Kentucky in 1798, has been discovered near New Rose.

Will Remarry.
Owensboro, Ky., Jan. 23.—Mrs. Mary Coomes, aged 18, was awarded a divorce from her husband, David Coomes, and Frank Fenwick at once obtained a license to marry her. They were wedded on Thursday morning.

Lieut. Fred L. Wilson at Home.
Versailles, Ky., Jan. 23.—Lieut. Fred L. Wilson is here from the Philadelphia on a furlough of leave. He is honored for bravery by promotion to a lieutenant and recently was made treasurer of the province of Antioque.

Andrew Sullivan Indicted.
Carrollton, Ky., Jan. 23.—The grand jury of Carroll county returned an indictment Wednesday against Andrew Sullivan, charging him with the murder of Jerome Way.

Carload of Speed.
Lexington, Ky., Jan. 23.—Garrett D. Wilson, the well-known horseman of this city, is now actively engaged in the preparation of a carload of youngsters to be shipped to New York city.
