BRAVERY REWARDED

Government Gives Position to Young Man of North Carolina.

Story of His Battle with Thieves in Post Office at Emma, N. C., and How He Spoiled Their Plans Although Severely Wounded.

As a reward for his devotion to duty and fearlessness in defending the trust, Postmaster General Payne has appointed Samuel H. Alexander, a young man 22 years old, to a clerkship in the office of the chief post office inspector at Washington. For the last year Young Alexander has been assistant postmaster at Emma, N. C. In February of last year the post office was attacked by armed burglars. Alexander fought them off, and, though repeatedly wounded, succeeded in sounding an alarm.

Emma is a small town. The post office is in the store of the postmaster and clerk and lived in a rear room of the store. On the night of February 6 he was preparing to retire, when he heard a knock on the front door. He inquired what was wanted, and on being told one of the burglars wanted his mail, unbarred the door. Finding the two masked men entered. Covering him with their revolvers, they cautioned him to keep quiet.

Fred R. Emerick, who for the last three years has managed the New Madison hotel at Madison Island, Mich., has fallen heir to \$300,000, a share of the estate of an uncle in Germany who recently died. The whole estate is valued at over \$500,000.

BOY PRINCE AS OUTLAW.

Murders and Robberies Laid to the Charge of a Russian Nobleman of the Caucasus.

A 15-year-old Georgian prince living near Kutais, in the Caucasus, has been arrested charged with a long series of murders and highway robberies. He owns an old stone medieval castle in which are two dungeons high over a rapid mountain stream, near the caravan road across Caucasus. SUSPECTED OF FELONY.

Edward P. Caldwell, Ed Stegner and Henry McGowan Arrested.

Louisville, Ky., March 3.—Edward P. Caldwell, who ran a drug store at Fifteenth and Prentiss streets, that was destroyed by fire at 1 o'clock Sunday morning, Edward Stegner, aged 17, and Henry McGowan, were arrested Sunday on the technical charge of being suspected felons. The police jury confessed that he and McGowan set fire to the drug store building and that they were to receive \$300 for their work. There was \$2,500 of insurance on the building and stock. Three men who roomed over the store had a narrow escape.

Commissioners Elect Officers.

Hopkinsville, Ky., March 5.—The new board of commissioners of the Western Kentucky Insane Asylum for the session, eight of the nine members being present, met and organized. Frank Quarles was elected chairman. Lucien H. Davis was elected treasurer, vice E. B. Long, and Joseph C. Buckner was chosen secretary, vice John Feland, who had been re-elected by the old board last week.

Murdered For His Money.

Harrodsburg, Ky., March 4.—A most horrible murder, with robbery as the incentive, was committed in this county. Edmund W. Hays, a veteran and pensioner of the civil war, aged 32, was the victim, while his wife, aged 30, is lying unconscious from terrible injuries on the temple, forehead and face.

Bank Robbers to Be Tried.

Hartford, Ky., March 5.—The Ohio circuit court convened here with a large attendance. About the most important case to come up will be that of the four bank robbers, H. L. Marsh, George S. Gray, James Keely and Joseph Mills, who blew open the safe of the Bank of Hartford, early in the morning of January 22.

To Do Away With Sunday Funerals.

Leitch, Ky., March 5.—The Louisville Ministerial Association appointed a committee of ministers to confer with the Louisville Undertakers' Association and officers of cemeteries in an effort to do away with Sunday funerals.

Fired a Bullet Through His Heart.

Hopkinsville, Ky., March 4.—Lawson Smith, aged 50, fired a bullet through his heart Monday. He was toll-gate keeper 20 years and had been independent since losing his position by freeing of the piked roads in this county.

KENTUCKY BLIZZARD.

Country Roads Are Impassable in Many Counties.

Frankfort, Ky., March 6.—The blizzard which followed the snow of Tuesday and Wednesday night was general over the state. In many counties the wind has caused drifts that make the roads impassable and in some places business is practically suspended. Trolley cars and telegraph and telephone service has been interfered with and railway travel impeded. At Paintsville, with two feet of snow on the level, it was still falling at 7 p. m. Wednesday evening. Eighteen miles is reported at Louisa and 14 at Williamsburg, where a vast number of sheep and lambs have been lost. Three feet at least caused the adjournment of court. Flemingsburg reports a foot and Vanceburg two feet, with heavy drifts. The blizzard hit Columbia carried eight inches of snow with it, and Mumfordsville got six. "Knee deep" on the streets of Dover caused ordinary pedestrians to remain indoors as much as possible.

John Doehof's Purchase.

Louisville, Ky., March 6.—John Doehof, of this city, who was for many years the Louisville manager of the American Tobacco Co., and who started the tobacco factories that afterward formed the nucleus of the Continental Tobacco Co., Wednesday bought for \$250,000 the controlling interest in the Manufacturers' Tobacco Co., of Louisville, which is an independent company.

No Extra Session Probable.

Frankfort, Ky., March 6.—The determination of Gov. Beckham not to call an extra session of the legislature matters with regard to some important legislation. It appears that an effort in good faith and earnestness is now being made to push through the bills which must be enacted before the time limit of the present session expires.

The Allied Parties' Conference.

Louisville, Ky., March 6.—Jo A. Parker, chairman of the national popular party conference, said Wednesday night that the conference of allied parties scheduled for April 2 at Louisville will be held at Memphis on May 1, unless a hall is furnished free at Louisville. Mr. Parker said he would decide the question of location definitely Thursday.

Mangled by a Train.

Covington, Ky., March 6.—George Crockett, aged 21 years, son of Charles Crockett, a traveling salesman, 110 East Seventeenth street, was killed Saturday afternoon, and instantly killed. It is thought he was trying to jump on a train and lost his footing. His body was horribly mangled. He was a car polisher for the C. & O.

Owensboro, Ky., March 6.—The "Milk Workers' convention cut off the pension of \$25 a month Mrs. Jennie Cook, widow of Wm. Cook, who was killed last fall at the light in Webster county. Mrs. Cook asked for an increase. She is said to have two boys able to support her.
