CONFEDERATE HOME.

Gen. Poyntz Favors Villa Inn and Expresses Hope it May be Dedicated in October.

Gen. J. M. Poyntz, commander of the Kentucky division of the United Confederate Veterans, announces that the negotiation for the establishment of the home for disabled and indigent Confederates at Pewee Valley have been completed, and it is hoped that the dedication will take place some time in October.

The following letter from Gen. Poyntz is the official announcement of the success of the negotiations:

Headquarters Kentucky Division, United Confederate Veterans.—The Commanding General takes great pride, as well as great pleasure, in announcing the location and immediate establishment of the home for disabled and indigent Confederates at Pewee Valley, in Oldham county, and the acquisition for this noble purpose of what is known as the Villa Ridge Inn.

The home thus secured will be the handsomest structure of its kind in the South, and the State of Kentucky has made liberal appropriation for its maintenance. It would not have been thought possible when at the State Reunion a year ago this matter was called to the attention of the Confederates of Kentucky, that in ten months such splendid results could have been obtained.

The great energy and zeal of comrades and the liberality of the Legislature have produced this superb condition, and the veterans are congratulated upon what has been so quickly and thoroughly done.

The attention of all camps and individuals is directed to the immediate payment of subscriptions already obtained and secure new ones to carry on this grand work. The great building, capable of caring for at least 100 veterans, is now furnished, and it is known that at least fifty comrades will at once seek the protection of this blessed benefaction.

In a few days notice of the date and place of the State Reunion will be announced. This has been delayed in order to hold, if possible, this reunion in connection with the opening of the Confederate Home.

Promptness in collecting and remitting subscriptions will allow the dedication in October, and all camps and individuals are to speedily help to bring about this glorious result. By order of

IRISHMAN.

Seventy-Four Years Old Mastered the German Tongue.

At the age of 74, James Alexander McBrayer, Anderson county, has just completed the translation from German into English, of a novel, "Brigitta," for which he has received a copyright, and will have the work published for private distribution among his friends.

Mr. McBrayer's achievement is all the more remarkable from the fact that he has seldom heard the German tongue spoken, and until he was 71 years of age had never opened a German book. In 1830 he began the study of the German language, and in a year could speak it fluently, and in two years had mastered it well enough to begin his work translating a novel, which he finished within twelve months.

Mr. McBrayer is of Irish descent, and comes of the famous Kentucky McBrayer family, and is one of the leading citizens of Anderson county. His life is another example of what pluck and perseverance will accomplish under trying conditions. Born March 23, 1828, Mr. Brayer's father died when James A. was a small boy, leaving a large family and a small estate. Young McBrayer put his shoulder to the wheel and did any work that he could find, among other things breaking rock on the turnpike, working in a hatter's, and turning a lathe for a cabinet maker.

All the time he was working he studied at night, and at 15 was proficient in Latin and the English branches, and obtained a position as a deputy in the Circuit Clerk's office, where he took up the study of law, and in a few years was admitted to the bar.

After six years as deputy clerk he defeated the clerk for election, and filled the office for twelve years, being twice re-elected. In 1866 he engaged in the bank business and for thirty-six years was one of the leading financiers of this section. He was twice married and reared a large family. To-day, at seventy-four years of age, he is hale and hearty, and is looking forward to many years of pleasure with his children and friends.

Turkey's Will Be Hill.

Turkeys for thanksgiving dinner are going to be a luxury both on account of scarcity and price. This conclusion has been reached by buyers who have made a canvass of the country districts, says the Chicago Tribune. "It is estimated the turkey crop will be one-half smaller than last year, and that prices on the Chicago market around Thanksgiving time, when the fowl is most in demand, will be about two cents a pound higher than a year ago. At the present time three and one-half cents a pound is being bid for car lots, and there are rumored sales as high as fourteen cents. This is an unheard of high price at this time of year. The turkeys which mostly come to the Chicago market are grown mostly in Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, Southern and Western Ohio, Central Illinois, Missouri and Kansas. Northern Indiana also contributes, and the Indian Territory, Oklahoma and Texas are coming to the front as turkey producers, following the increase of agricultural pursuits. In the Southern States the crop has been ruined by drought and shortage of grain crops last summer and fall. These conditions compel farmers to sell. In the more Northern States, where the supply of food was better, heavy spring rains killed off the summer turkeys as fast as they were hatched."

A Blind Hunter.

Across the Kentucky river from Mercer county, just back of the Jessamine county cliffs, against whose tall peaks the clouds get wrecked and go to pieces, is the modest home of Tom Johnson, a most remarkable man, says the Harrodsburg Democrat. Mr. Johnson has been stone blind since early youth, but notwithstanding the loss of his eyes, he is one of the most enthusiastic fox hunters in the State. Often alone he follows his hounds among the Kentucky river cliffs in a gallop, and with apparent recklessness that one with less vision would not dare imitate, and though he has done this for many years, he has never met with an accident. He knows every nook and crook in the cliffs, and when he comes to a very dangerous point he dismounts, takes hold of the horse's tail and the animal guides him in safety over places where a misstep of the faithful beast would hurl both man and horse to certain destruction.

Augustine Birrell on the Coromation.

Mr. Augustine Birrell, the author of "Obiter Dicta," and other delightful books of literary and social essays, has contributed to the October Magazine Number of The Outlook an article on the coronation. In the course of the article he tells, apropos of the fact that England's line of monarchs has had only one break, the following incident, which shows how Mr. Gladstone regarded Oliver Cromwell. Mr. Birrell says: "I once had the good fortune to accompany Mr. Gladstone over a country house, the Chequers in Buckinghamshire, which then contained many Cromwellian relics, in which however, the most famous member of Parliament of his century could not bring himself to take any interest. Oliver, so Mr. Gladstone said by way of excuse, "was no lover of liberty." I led him to a chest and showed him a drawer holding the white christening robes of the infant Protector, and ventured to say, "At least, Mr. Gladstone, you cannot deny that Oliver was a Christian.
