The Elliott Institute Presidency.

As elsewhere announced, Rev. G. P. Simmons returned Saturday from Kentucky, where he went to investigate an offer of the presidency of a private institution of learning in the Central part of the State known as the Elliott Institute. Holding public position as he does, and being in the public eye almost continually, Mr. Simmons' movements and plans are to some extent a matter of interest to the whole community. Therefore the News interviewed him in reference to his trip to the Blue Grass State and its probable results.

Elliott Institute is situated in the rich and populous region of Central Kentucky, of which Lexington is the center. It is patronized liberally by the people around, who pay more attention to private institutions of learning than to the public schools. The Institute receives large tuition fees. It is the purpose of the management to enter upon an aggressive policy in building up the Institute, and Mr. Simmons was thought to be the man to be at the head of it under such a policy.

"Will you accept?"
"Yes, I expect to."
"When will you go?"
"That is not fully determined. The school opens in September, and I desire to be on the ground as long a time as possible before the opening."
"Then you will go there at least as early as August?"
"I presume so."
"What will you do with your property here?"
"It will be for sale, or rent if not sold."

Why do you wish to leave Newton Falls, Mr. Simmons?
"The principal reason is that the winters here do not agree with us. Our children have been sick every winter since we have been here, and both Mrs. Simmons and myself have been affected in the same way. With the coming of spring and summer, our health improves, but we are fully convinced that we will have better health away from this climate in the winter."

That is what a grand old man, that noble servant of God, Elder Smoot does, when he makes his annual pilgrimage from away over in the South-eastern part of Old Virginia to his little flock down in Robertson county.

These believers in that faith are poor in this world's goods; the old preacher does not mind a little thing like that. It is even stated that in the years he has ministered to their spiritual needs, he has refused to accept any salary.

He travels that eight hundred miles through sunshine and storm, without hope of earthly reward or recompense; it is the Master's work that is calling; the laborers are few, but he is one of those who are faithful, and willing to serve without money and without price.

We do not know this noble old man, but we do know that on the final day the verdict will be "well done, good and faithful servant—enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

An old friend of W. J. Bryan in an interview with a Courier-Journal reporter says "I have known him all my life," he said, "and have known him well. He is a brilliant man and I am a great admirer of his although I am not of his way of thinking. Bryan always had a leaning for the newspaper business and prefers it to law, or even politics. He used to write a great deal for a paper in Omaha, and is now happy with his Commoner. He was always a speaker, and I heard him not long ago speak in a church in Philadelphia. He knew the pastor of the church, who had lived in Lincoln, and agreed to lecture there, charging nothing, to help raise a fund to pay off a mortgage on the church. They charged \$5 a seat, and the church was filled so full that it was impossible for another person to enter. Several hundreds were turned away. The fund was raised in one night. The act was characteristic of Bryan. He is a strong Presbyterian and is a great church man."

A departure in horse show classification is the championship classes of the Louisville Horse Show Association. They are open classes except as to previous winners. The following horses, having won championships in the Louisville show, are not eligible to compete in the classes in which they have won championships:

Harness, single-Lord Brilliant, British Lion, Prince Charming.
Harness, pairs-Lord Brilliant and Lord Golden, Prince Charming and Prince Charm ing, Sampson and Sigbee.

Saddle Horse, three gait-Motto, Christabel, Sousa.
Saddle Horse, five gait, Montgomery Chief, Czar McDonald, Gypsy Queen and Frenchman.

There are six championships this year, two being added for roadsters, single and double. A total of \$6,000 is offered for champion winners; \$1,000 for each class, divided into \$700, \$200 and \$100, for the first, second and third prize winners respectively. Of the first prize \$100 will be in souvenir plate. The total offered by the Louisville Association is \$22,000 in seventy-six classes.

The championship classes are shown the first night of the show Monday, September 28, and the first prize championship winners are excluded from winning in other classes in which they may be entered except the tandems, four-in-hands and Batony Challenge Cup.
