KILLED ON A HUNTING TRIP.
 Kentucky Youth is Shot Accidentally by Companion.

Covington Ky., Dec. 27.—While hunting with his brother and a companion, Burrell Cooper, 19, was accidentally shot in the back by Everett Burton, 22, and died within ten minutes. Both were residents of South Portsmouth, Greenup County, Ky. The scene of the tragedy was three miles west of their home and occurred at 9 o'clock Monday morning.

Sam Cooper, a brother of the victim, is employed as a brakeman on the C. & O. railroad. He left Covington, Ky., last Saturday morning to spend the holidays with his parents and brother on the farm. Everett Burton lives on an adjoining farm to the Coopers.

The three young men left their home early Monday morning for a hunting expedition. At the time of the accident Burton was seated on a log trying to extract a shell from his repeating shotgun.

Sam Cooper, who was standing in the rear, asked him when he was doing and Burton turned toward him as the gun went off, the charge tearing a large hole in Burrell Cooper's back, who was shot on a rock some distance away.

STABBED THREE TIMES.
 An Unknown Man Found Dead on the Pike Near Richmond.

Richmond, Ky., Dec. 29.—An unknown man was found dead about one mile north of Richmond, Ky., on the Cincinnati and Lexington turnpike, about 9 o'clock Wednesday morning. He was stabbed three times through the heart with apparently a small, sharp instrument, such as a small blade of a pocket knife. The trunk of the body was bare of clothing. A coat and vest lay near by, with a watch and chain and some other small articles. There was no sign of a struggle. A light snow fell during the night, which perhaps covered up traces of a struggle, if any took place. The victim was a middle-aged man, weight about 150 pounds, with a light mustache.

A LIQUOR "CURE."
 Five-Year-Old Negro Died After Being Given a Dose.

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 29.—John Clark, a Negro five years old, is dead at the home of his parents in Lyndon of acute alcoholism, in consequence of excessive doses of wine and a mixture of wine and whiskey administered to him by his stepfather and his mother, in an effort to keep him from ever having a desire for drink by making him sick on it.

Remains Are Still Unidentified.
 Mayfield, Ky., Dec. 29.—The body of the man found with his throat cut on J. H. Reynolds' place last week is still unidentified. He has the appearance of having been a man of intelligence and refinement. Hundreds of people have viewed the body.

Legislators Looking for Quarters.
 Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 29.—Manager Wetzell, of the Capital Hotel, has received several requests from members of the general assembly for rooms in anticipation of an extra session to provide a suitable site for the new capitol.

His Arm Amputated.
 Campton, Ky., Dec. 29.—Floyd Salley, son of George Salley, former assessor of this county, was shot in the left arm by George Combs, on Stillwater creek. Dr. Carroll, of this city, was called to amputate the member.

To Trail Burglars.
 Lexington, Ky., Dec. 27.—Capt. V. G. Milliken, of Wilmore, passed through here with his bloodhound, bound for Lincoln county to trail burglars who blew open a safe in the store of William Cummings, at Preachersville, and obtained a large sum of money.

Noted Hotel Burned.
 Glasgow, Ky., Dec. 28.—The Monte hotel at Glasgow Junction was destroyed by fire. Less estimated at about \$9,000, with \$1,000 insurance. This was one of the best known hotels in the United States, as most of the people who visited Mammoth Cave stopped there.

Contracted For Twelve Wells.
 Lexington, Ky., Dec. 29.—Contracts have been made by William Meter, on whose place a strong flow of natural gas was recently discovered, with Benjamin Talbot, of Chicago, whereby the latter is to sink one dozen wells on the farm at the depth of 2,000 feet each.

 Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 28.—The Franklin county board of health called on the fiscal court of the county to join with the state prison commission and the city of Frankfort in the erection of an eruptive hospital for the care of smallpox patients.

MARCUM DAMAGE TRIAL.

The Case Was Resumed After a Couple of Days' Recess.

Winchester, Ky., Dec. 23.—After a recess of a couple of days the trial of the Marcum case was resumed Tuesday and about 20 witnesses for the defense answered to their names.

So far the witnesses examined Tuesday have been clerks in Hargis Bros' store. They agree that when Marcum was killed Tom White came across the street at once from the courthouse; that Judge Hargis ordered the courthouse searched and that the searching party found nothing; that Hargis expressed a willingness to issue a warrant for his arrest. Capt. Ewen, who was with Marcum when he was killed, repeatedly said he did not see who did the killing.

The testimony Tuesday afternoon in the Marcum case was not of a sensational character. Several witnesses testified as to the familiar facts to the killing of Marcum, that Judge Hargis ordered the courthouse searched without effect, that he expressed an earnest desire to capture the assassin, that Ewen declared that he did not know who killed Marcum and other facts that have been previously brought out.

Several witnesses declared that the reputation of Capt. Ewen for truth and veracity was not good and the moral character of Ruck Cottongane and wife was bad.

Several members of the special grand jury which investigated the death of Marcum and indicted Tom White and Curt Jett for the crime were present to testify that the testimony of Henry Noble on this trial was different from that given before that body. Judge Bouton decided that they might testify that they were members of that body and that Noble was before it, but that the secrets of the grand jury room should be kept inviolate and should not be made public.

Winchester, Ky., Dec. 29.—The testimony in the Marcum case Wednesday afternoon was wholly devoid of sensation and was principally devoted to attacks on the character of Ruck Cottongane and wife.

Capt. B. J. Ewen, a prominent witness for the defense, and a number of witnesses are here for the same purpose, who have never been examined. Nearly all the witnesses testified that the moral character of Mr. and Mrs. Ruck Cottongane was very bad and the reputation of Capt. B. J. Ewen for truth and veracity was bad. Several witnesses testified to the relative positions of Marcum's house and the rock quarry from which it is alleged an attempt was made to assassinate Marcum.
