### Express Company Loses Suit.

A damage suit of unusual character was decided by the Court of Appeals in the case of A. P. Alcorn against the Adams Express Company, appealed from the Estill Circuit Court. Alcorn, a soldier in the army, died in the Philippines, and his body was shipped home. Alcorn contracted with Wells-Fargo Express Company to deliver the body at the home of Alcorn in Estill county. When the body reached Irvine, the Adams Express Company refused to deliver the body until charges amounting to \$138 were paid. Alcorn sued for damages, and the court says he is entitled to \$300, and directs that judgment be entered for that amount. Two trials were had, and at the last pre-emptory instructions were given against the express company.

### BREAD OF VIKINGS FOUND

Made From Pine Bark and Pea Meat. It Was Discovered in Gotland.

An interesting find was made at Ljunga, Gotland, by Dr. Schuttger, professor at Stockholm university. This is some bread that dates from the time of Vikings.

Microscopical examination has shown this bread to be made from pine bark and pea meat, thus proving the fact that peas were grown in Sweden as far back as a thousand years ago.

Archaeological excavation has so far brought to light only a few specimens of bread dating from ancient or prehistoric times. The few loaves excavated in Egypt and in Swiss lake dwellings are of the highest archeological interest.

In the northern countries only one or two finds of this kind have so far been made, foremost among which should be mentioned a corn meal loaf dating from the fourth century A. D. which was discovered by Dr. Schuttger in 1898 in connection with the excavation of Boberg castle--Scientific American.
