

New Primary Law.

No one but a dyed-in-the-wool partisan may vote in the Kentucky primary under the amended primary law, enacted by the General Assembly. The amended act strictly defines the qualifications in the law that a voter must "be a member of the party for whose nominees he intends to vote and shall have affiliated with the party." It says "no person shall be deemed to have affiliated with the party for whose nominees he intends to cast his vote if he voted against the nominee or nominees of such party at the last general election." The act also does away with the requirement for a certain percentage of electors signing a petition to get the name of a candidate on the primary ballot and requires only the petition of the candidate, accompanied by the affidavit of two electors as to his eligibility. Where there is only one candidate, the officer with whom the candidate's petition is filed may issue him a certificate of nomination. Unused ballots are required to be so stamped and returned to the County Clerk.

Democratic Appointments.

A sub-committee of the Senate Post-office Committee reported favorably the nominations of R. L. Brown to be postmaster of Somerset; E. W. Hackney, of London, and Mark Kehoe, of Maysville. Senator Bradley spoke at great length against the appointments at Maysville and London, maintaining that the removal of the Republican incumbents was an injustice to them. Senator James told the committee that at London Senator Bradley in 1912 had removed the Republican postmaster because a newspaper which he was said to control had declared for Roosevelt.

A Berea Agricultural Student.

Mr. I. B. Chestnut, who is finishing the agricultural course in Berea College, left that institution last week to accept the position of farm demonstrator for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, in Mingo county, West Virginia. This is the seventh important position filled by Berea agricultural students within the past year. We certainly consider his appointment a very important and popular one, as the study of agriculture and rural life is rapidly becoming one, which will not go by in a day.

Feeding Chickens Gravel So They Will Weigh More.

"New sidelights on the high cost of live poultry has been brought to notice in New York City. Live chickens that are ravenously hungry after reaching the railroad yards are fed a paste made of gravel, sand and ground rock, using a little sticky flour for a binder. The famished chickens will greedily cram their craws with as much as a half pound of this rock ballast, which being indigestible, remains in the birds' digestive tracts for days, or until the consumers' hands are reached. In a five-pound chicken the gravel adds about 10 per cent to the consumer's price. In a year the ten million pounds of sand and gravel thus cost the people of New York about \$1,500,000."—Farm and Fireside.

A lock of President Lincoln's hair sold for \$650 at the auction sale of Lincolniana, from the effects of the late Major William H. Lambert, of Philadelphia. The lock was cut from the wounded head of President Lincoln the day following his assassination, by Mrs. Schuyler Colfax, wife of the Speaker of the House, especially for Mrs. Lincoln. Mr. Carnegie's Gifts.

According to figures issued by Andrew Carnegie's secretary, the great "steel king," has given away nearly \$100,000,000. As regards his fortune of a few years ago, he is a comparatively poor man. He has given away nearly all of his millions of U. S. Corporation bonds and if he lives a few years longer he will probably have attained his ambition of having disposed "of every penny of his wealth with the exception of a \$25,000,000 sinking fund, reserved for himself and family." Following is a list of Mr. Carnegie's principal benefactions:

- Carnegie Corporation of New York, \$125,000,000.
 - Carnegie United Kingdom Trust, \$10,000,000.
 - Carnegie Foundation for the advancement of teaching, \$10,125,000.
 - Carnegie Institution, Washington, D. C., \$22,000,000.
 - Carnegie Institute, Pittsburg, \$32,000,000.
 - Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, \$10,000,000.
 - Carnegie Hero Fund Commission and gifts to libraries (estimated), \$60,000,000.
 - Total, \$205,125,000.
- To this tremendous total may be added possibly \$100,000,000 of miscellaneous gifts, bringing the grand total almost up to the sum of \$400,000,000.

A Few Facts.

The 1913 cotton crop was the largest ever grown, the census bureau reports. The total number of bales grown was 14,767,151.

The total sales for the 1913-4 season for the Lexington tobacco market was 39,332,875 pounds.

The proposition to submit to the States a constitutional amendment for woman suffrage was defeated in the U. S. Senate. An effort to repeal the Fifteenth Amendment was also defeated.

Secretary McAdoo has warned all collectors of internal revenue that income tax returns are inviolably confidential and any disclosures by officials will be punished.

More than 400,000 pianos are built in this country annually. They are valued at nearly \$70,000,000.

The Pennsylvania Railroad last year paid out \$5,143 on account of accidents to passengers who tripped over other passengers' grips placed in the aisles of passenger trains. That is one of the reasons why its trainmen are instructed not to permit luggage to remain in the aisles of coaches.

More Quail.

J. Quincy Ward, executive agent of the Kentucky State Fish and Game Commission, told the members of the Kentucky Fish and Game Protective Association that Kentucky would receive this year for the replenishment of the streams and fields 14,000,000 fish, 100 pairs Hungarian partridges, and deer and quail in small quantities, if purchasable. Deer hunting will again be a Kentucky sport, according to Mr. Ward. Twenty-four deers are already ranging preserves in the mountains of the State. Quail will be the hardest to get, as there are no states that will allow these birds taken out of them.
