## Commencement Week at C. H. S.

Beginning on Tuesday exhibition day, when the process of construction of the articles on display was described by members of the class in Manual training, the week has been a notable one in the history of the school. Seldom has finer workmanship and skill been shown than was seen here in the tables, desks, stands, chests, hat-racks and other articles made by these boys. Mr. Coates then cited many of the great characters of all ages beginning with Abraham, whom he stated he believed to be an American, for he went West, of Moses, Columbus, and on down the line to Grant, Roosevelt, and Bryan, men of determination, of purpose, and he here emphasized his message to the Class—that success awaited those who pressed forward, who knew no turning back and that on leaving the High School they should be prepared to do something, for this is the test of efficiency.
