Judge Parrish Pays High Tribute To Roosevelt

One of the finest tributes to the late Col. Roosevelt that has been paid by a Richmond lawyer, Judge Stephen D. Parrish, in a letter to a friend in Illinois, which Capt. W. T. Short copied and brought to the office of the Daily Register.

I will never forget my delighted stay in Illinois during the fall of 1912, when we were making such desperate efforts to split the state of Illinois between Theodore Roosevelt and William H. Taft.

It was on the success of that effort that the election of President Wilson turned. There has been many ups and downs in the world since that time and it was one evening during that fall that the news came to Decatur to the effect that the ex-President had been dangerously wounded in one of the northern cities, and now the news is flashed this morning throughout the world that this wonderful man is dead.

He was a wonderful man, and the work done by him will follow and continue to dominate and influence political conditions in this country for many years. In common with all men of genius and master ability, he had his faults, nevertheless in the main his life was one of usefulness, constructiveness and power.
