SOME FOOD LICENSES ENDED

Licenses have been cancelled and will no longer be required of firms and persons dealing in syrups, poultry fish, fresh fruits and vegetables, canned goods, bread and other bakery products, arsenic, catsups, green coffee, and sausage casings, and in the foods made from any of the following commodities: Buckwheat, broom corn, sunflower seed, beans, peas, dried grains of brewers and distillers, baled hay, straw and animal products. The order also affects the dealers in sorghum grains, peanuts, sugar beets, soy beans, condensed milk and all commercial feeds.

According to dispatches from Berlin, Riga is now completely in the hands of the Red army, the Bolshevik forces having advanced from Irvak and occupied the station at Neugut.

Director General Hines will ask Congress for another appropriation of \$200,000,000 for the Railroad Administration's revolving fund to cover improvements and extensions.

Killing at Nicholasville

At Nicholasville Thursday Joseph McGran, a young Nicholasville man, home on a furlough from the army, was shot and instantly killed near the L. & N. depot. John Reynolds, a citizen of Nicholasville, and former employe of the Indian Refining Company is in jail charged with the shooting. Particulars of the circumstances which led up to the incident and the causes are lacking. Reynolds refuses to talk. He is married and has a family.

McGran, who was to have returned to his regiment at Camp Sheridan, Alabama, in a day or two, leaves a young wife. He was about 26 years of age. His brother, George, is in the navy with the American fleet in British waters. He had one sister, Malinda.

Oil Field News.

The Big Sinking Oil Company has just brought in a flowing well on the Moss St. John lease in Lee county. This well which is No. 4 of this company, is rated at 500 barrels.

Judge J. M. Stevenson and Dr. L. C. Young recently purchased a lease of 800 acres adjoining the Rhodes Hall farm of the Interstate Petroleum Company in Lee county. The deal was made through O. L. Pollard, attorney for the estate of T. L. Roberts. The price is said to have been around \$12,000.

Among other wells to come in recently in Lee county is the No. 4 John Williams, belonging to the Rex Oil Company, Mohoney Bros., and Hedrick. This is estimated as being good for 200 barrels. They are now starting to drill Nos. 5 and 6 on the same farm.

On the 75 acres Pendergrast tract purchased recently from Noland and Rogers by W. P. Williams Oil Corporation, the initial well was completed and is said to be good for 25 barrels.
