Predicts National Disaster If R. R. Wages Are Lowered

(By Associated Press)
Washington Feb 11—Any disposition of the railroad problem that would lower wages would threaten a national disaster, said A. B. Garretson, president of the Order of Railway Conductors, today before the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee. "If there is any unwise effort to reduce the income of the wage earner," he declared, "it will strengthen the spirit of discontent that will shake, if not destroy, the social structure. The spirit that would arise, should the railroad employes be dissatisfied, would communicate itself to such a large body of the population," Garretson said, "that the country would be brought to the verge of industrial rebellion."

To Save New Navy Bill

Washington, Feb. 11—To save the three-year naval building program from defeat through a parliamentary coup, the House Rules Committee today ordered a rule reported making legislation authorizing the construction of 10 battleships and 10 scout cruisers, in order for House consideration as part of the \$720,000,000 naval appropriation bill.

Killing in Lancaster

James Grimes, 33 years old, who resides five miles east of Lancaster, was shot and instantly killed yesterday, and his uncle, Ben Grimes, 60 years old, was arrested soon afterward. The motive for the crime is not known. Witnesses of the tragedy which took place in a boarding house in Lancaster, say no words were spoken by either man. Grimes is survived by his widow and five young children.

Bolsheviki Sold Out Russia

(By Associated Press)
Washington, Feb. 11—Investigation of lawless propaganda, I. W. W. activities, and other sources of disorder in the United States began before the Senate subcommittee today. The first witness was William Huntington, former commercial attaché of the American embassy in Petrograd. Describing conditions in Russia, he said Bolsheviki agitators took German money to further their own propaganda and thus broke down the morale of the Russian soldiers. He said "They were little better crooks than the Germans who used them as tools."

Ought To Have Shot, Anyway

(By Associated Press)
New York, Feb. 11—Shouting "to hell with America," and cheering for the Bolsheviki, the red flag and the I. W. W., 54 alien born persons were placed on a boat guarded by soldiers, taken to Ellis Island for deportation, after arriving on a special train during the night from the west. After one of them attacked a policeman, soldiers were called and instructed to shoot to kill if necessary.

Caldwell High School News

The Junior Red Cross made its regular annual report to headquarters recently, and among other things, the following interesting items were reported:
Hospital supplies made 286
Refugee garments 356
Knitted articles 304
Nurses supplies 16
Tables for army "Y" 2
Quilts for hospitals and refugees 54
Each grade made regular periods every week, in which this work was done, as the regular work of the handwork activities of the school.

One of the great things which the Junior Red Cross has inaugurated is the Modern Health Tournament in which the schools of the nation are beginning a great crusade for inculcating health habits in the children of the nation. The children enroll by obligating themselves to observe daily such things as:
1. Washing hands before each meal.
2. Brushing teeth both night and morning.
4. Playing out of doors at least thirty minutes daily.
5. Sitting up and standing up straight to eat slowly, etc.
6. Keeping neat and cheerful constantly, etc., etc.

There are eleven things to be scored daily by the child and certified to by the parent or guardian, which is to be countersigned by the teacher; and the grades and school scoring the percentage will receive appropriate banners indicating their rank in the contest with other grades and schools, both of the local schools and the other grades and schools, of the state, as well as with the schools of other states.

A satisfactory score for two weeks entitles a pupil to the rank of "page" with suitable button; indicating that rank; five weeks satisfactory score gives one the title of "Squire," for which there is a different button; ten weeks advance one to the rank of "Knight" and the honor is indicated by the wearing of a neat silver pin; fifteen weeks complete the period of the first Tournament, and a satisfactory score of this time entitles one to wear the gold pin of this order, called "Knight Banneret."

It is believed that the beneficial effects of fifteen weeks daily health habits will fix the habits in most of the children, and prove well worth the time and expense of the contest beginning last Sunday, February 9, and to be well towards the front at the finish on May 24th.
