

MASONIC SIGN OF DISTRESS SAVED SOLDIER'S LIFE (Louisville Times)

How a German medical officer probably saved his life after he had given the Masonic sign of distress was told by Elmer H. Schmidt, 23 years old, of 1466 South street, who was wounded by shrapnel, gassed and stricken with influenza during his eleven months' service overseas, five months of which he spent in the first-line trenches. He was so black when

picked up after being gassed that upon his removal to an army hospital placed in a negro ward. Schmidt, who held the rank of Master Engineer senior grade, in the 116 Engineers, arrived at Camp Zachary Taylor last night with a casual company from Camp Mills. He visited his home last evening, and sat up almost throughout the night telling thrilling experience to members of the family. He returned to camp this morning and expects to receive his honorable discharge in a few days.

Recovering from the sharpnel wound, which punctured his intestines and necessitated his undergoing a surgical operation, Schmidt returned to the battle front and was fighting until the last gun was fired. The night before the armistic was signed 136 members of his company made the supreme sacrifice.

Germans took the position Americans had occupied when Schmidt fell wounded with shrapnel. He gave the Masonic sign of distress to a German medical officer, who was a member of the fraternity and did all in his power for him. It was launch a counter attack and after dressing his wound the Germans left Schmidt on the field instead of taking him prisoner.

The American troops drove the enemy back and Schmidt was sent back to a hospital.
