

A dispatch from Washington says that Republican members of the House are planning to give Capt. King Swope, Danville, a rousing reception when he is sworn in as the Representative of the Eighth Kentucky district. Their information is that Capt. Swope, who will be the youngest member of Congress—he is 25 years old—will take the oath of office sometime this week.

The Browns defeated the Danville Giants here August 1st by the score of 3 to 1. The Browns were minus their star pitcher, H. Tye and their fleet footed outfielder, Phelps. The defeat of the giants was a hard blow to the Boyle county fans. Pointer started the game and pitched four innings, after which Glover and Spillman took up the burden. The Giants scored in the first and made three in the third, after which they were shut out the remainder of the game.
